

Good Bye to NODA

Cowboy

ver the last few weeks I've been unpacking boxes after my relocation to central Florida. It has been a bit of a bittersweet time; though I'm very excited to be in the land of sunshine and warm weather, I know that I will miss the friends and good times I've had in my 15 years in Cleveland. I've also been thinking about my riding, my NODA experiences and

dressage in general. And I'm always thinking about Cowboy, because he's truly a special guy who deserves to finish his career w/out the need for wool coolers, winter blankets and icy footing.

So the point of this article is to pay tribute to those who have supported and helped me through 6 years of dressage – which came to me indirectly and late in my horse career – after trail riding, carriage driving and hunters. Dressage was interesting to me, but also an attempt to keep an ex-hunter sound by switching her job. That was when I first really worked with Gretchen Singleton, who has supported me and guided me through

every step of the endless learning that is dressage, and through three very different horses.

The hunter mare sadly did not stay sound, though we did have a year of learning to go forward with some contact and to ride training level tests. It was at this point that I was introduced – by Gretchen – to NODA and its great schooling show program.

The Hanoverian that followed was seven and schooling second/third level. However the horse was ultimately not a good fit for me. But we did tackle more of the NODA schooling shows occasionally with some moments of "brilliance" - one judge told me to call her if I ever wanted to sell the horse. Another sat in the Crosswinds booth and watched w/ fear and trepidation as this horse spent what seemed like 5 minutes twirling, bucking, and finally leaving me in the ring while heading into one of Bob Weston's stalls. Gretchen tried her best to help me figure out the horse, but it was hopeless.

So shopping I went - again. Now here's a reminder that I'm an amateur, and our horse decisions can be iffy. Sometimes they don't work as noted above. Sometimes they do. I brought Gretchen a video of a horse who was 15 (old), 16'3" (too big and long), a Thoroughbred (not a warmblood). Why – because his name was Cowboy, which I thought was funny for a dressage horse, and because he loved to trail ride, and also was pretty cheap, which was a big positive after the Hanoverian experience. Oh, by the way, he had been shown through Prix St. Georges. She watched the video and sent me on the road to go ride him.

What I got was the perfect schoolmaster. He is truly bombproof. He has no issues anywhere about anything - EVER. He likes horse shows. He happily gave up the double bridle and went back to the long and low thing at training level. He has been sound consistently for the four plus years I've had him. We went to

our first (recognized) show three weeks after he came to Cleveland. We went to Regionals that year.

Then we ran into our first wall: the sitting trot. I was 50+ years old, with minimal equitation training and I wanted so badly to move up a few of the levels. But his bouncy thoroughbred trot

was a huge problem. Gretchen gave me lots of lunge line lessons; she told me to ride w/ out stirrups; she made me laugh and hurt at the same time; after months of torture we made some progress. Then she introduced me to Nancy Smith and encouraged me to ride with her periodically to get additional perspective and input. One of my early discussions with Nancy was about how the sitting trot needed to be my "best friend"....not in this lifetime!!

With two people now helping me, the trot work progressed from "enemy" to "acquaintance" to "pretty good friend". We moved through first, second and third levels.

We also discovered Florida when in 2008 a vacation idea turned into six weeks in Mt. Dora, Florida, riding nearly daily with Nancy's guidance. That, in turn started the decision to relocate to a great little town in a warmer climate. Back in Cleveland that summer we began fourth level.

This past winter in Florida, Nancy and I had a discussion about Cowboy's age (now 19), his fitness and my goals. What I feared was a conversation about his retirement, became a real discussion about something I never really thought would happen – that we could, with work, try Prix St. Georges this summer. It's been work, no question. We have some finessing to do. But when I finished my first PSG test at the NODA recognized show, there was probably not a happier person on the planet. Cowboy, on the other hand, said he'd been there, done that, and what's the big deal?? So now, as we head south, our goal is those two scores that will get me my silver medal. We're close, I'm focused and he will help.

I have loved (almost) every minute of the learning process. It has been hard, but rewarding and with dressage, at least measurement of progress is easy. I'm goal-oriented, and this sport works well with my personality. I only wish I had started 20 or so years earlier, when my body might have been a bit more cooperative.

So – thank you to Gretchen for the <u>endless</u> help and support; thank you to NODA for a great combination of schooling and recognized show opportunities, and for the ability to meet many wonderful and hardworking people. I have truly enjoyed my two years as treasurer. (I think Gretchen had something to do with that too...) I will miss you all. Thanks to Nancy for pushing me, which she will still get to do in Florida! And finally – Cowboy, you are the best.

Ask the Expert – Jan Ebeling Style!

What can lower-level riders do to maximize their scores on their tests?

n order to maximize your scores at shows, being well prepared is the key to success. If you can perfect some of the basic tasks in dressage, you'll be surprised how many little hidden points you are able to collect. Our sport has such a subjective element to itself that a beautiful presentation will definitely score higher than a sloppy one of equal quality. Try to perfect your seat, keep your chin and head up, shoulders back and stretch your legs. Look good and do it with a smile because you know that you can!

Be sure to ride your test(s) as home at least once or twice a week. This should include a timed warm up phase. It is important to go through the test without any interruptions even if you make mistakes. It is crucial to know how your horse responds if things are not perfect, as well as your recovery from mistakes to focus on the next movement. Then go back through the mistakes in order to reschool your horse.

Are they any common mistakes people make when riding tests at shows?

Being able to focus is of great importance. Therefore, you must stay calm and try to eliminate anything that can possibly make you nervous and make you break your concentration.

Know where the warm up and competition arenas are and how long it takes to get from one to the other (sometimes they can be far apart). Know your ride time and double check the morning of the class, sometimes this can change daily. No one can make you go early but sometimes classes get moved up. There is nothing worse than not having enough time to warm up. Accuracy is probably one of the more important elements of your test. Try to ride perfectly shaped arena figures at the letters, not just near them. Circles should be round, straight lines truly straight, and letter to letter diagonals are crucial and a great way to pick up points. Top it off with corners that show your horse's ability to bend. Practice your halts daily, they are worth just as much as a medium trot, leg yield or a passage, and usually there are 3 in each test, as well as starting off your test, with a bang! Judges will be very appreciative of these small nuances as well as showing off your emphasis of basic training.

If you do make mistakes, try not to lose your focus. One or two mistakes will not bring the score down too much if the overall basics are correct. that is if your horse is in a steady frame and tempo. Most of all, have fun and enjoy all the hard work that you have put into this moment.

How can a rider improve the "stretchy circle?"

The "stretchy" circle is a movement that checks up on your horse's fundamental training. If your horse understands that he has to go forward into the contact of the hand in a steady tempo and rhythm, letting the horse stretch downward, the forward should not be a problem. Be sure to keep contact and slight bend when performing this exercise, make sure that the horse is not behind the vertical. Throwing the reins away has nothing to do with stretching. It will result in your horse only being strung out. Try to not abruptly drop and pickup the reins. Take your time so that the horse doesn't lose it's balance and ends up getting tense.

Winter Grooming Tips to keep your Horses Coat in Tip-Top Shape!

orses are like Indian Food – they need a Good Curry!

A good daily curry will do wonders for a winter coat. I like two use two types of curries – the metal "spring" ones to really get down to the skin surface, and the Haas Der Gute plastic curry. These do a great job of separating the hair, lifting up sloughed dry skin and dirt, and increasing circulation, not to mention breaking up clumps of dried mud! The hard teeth can be quite gentle, depending on how hard you use it. Plus, your horse will enjoy it on his "itchy spots". (Mine practically falls over on me when I get to the wither area!) If really dirty, an equine vacuum can help (if your horse does not object!). Curry as you normally would, then go over the same area with the vacuum. It really picks up the deep-down dirt!

Give Your Horse the Brush-Off!

Follow your currying with a stiff brush. The stiff bristles will again reach down to the skin surface, and with a flick of your wrist, will flick away dirt and dander, while helping distribute the natural hair oils. (I really like the Haas Mini-Mahne Brush. The bristles do a great "flicking" job!)After a curry, your horse's coat will be a bit of a mess, so the stiffer bristles on this type of dandy brush will again separate the hairs and smooth them down again.

Next, follow with a soft brush. A natural bristle like horsehair is best, as it will gently sweep off any remaining dander, and again help with redistribution of the natural hair oils. The natural bristles will also help polish the coat. If you decide to use any nondrying coat spray, now's the time to mist! Use the natural bristle soft brush to help brush in the coat conditioner. Many coats can get dry this time of year, and most breakage of the hair shaft can occur. A couple of nice coat conditioners are Foxfire, Canter Silk, or Avocado Mist.

Everyone made it home although we are still finding hidden dried limestone footing in our tack!

Success stories still prevailed with the following: Charlotte Bayley and Markus took the LEC Championship 6th place in

Winter Washing

If you have access to a heated washrack and a draft-free area, you may want to treat your horse to a warm bath now and then during the winter months (if not below freezing temperatures!). Add a bit of your favorite soap (I like Xtreme's ShowWhite) or a splash of Vetrolin to a bucket of warm water and get to scrubbing with a soft jelly-scrubber or Bluegrass Bathing Mitt. After a warm rinse, throwing on a few coolers will help your horse keep warm while he's drying. Wool or Polarfleece do the best job at wicking, so he'll also dry a bit quicker! (of course if you're lucky enough to have access to heat lamps, those work wonders!).

Some of us aren't blessed with a heated washrack, or even hot water in some barns! Not to worry – the trick of "Hot Toweling" can be your best friend for winter grooming! Gather a bunch of clean and dry towels, a bucket with comfortably hot water (from the tap or from a bucket heater), and add just a tiny drop of shampoo. The little bit of shampoo will help the dirt "stick" to the towel and not your horse! The water you are using rinses it right off! Dip in a towel, wring it out, and get to scrubbing one area at a time, quartering your horse (keeping ¾ of your horse covered with a cooler while working on the other ¼). If the cooler gets damp, add another. When your water looks dirty, or gets cool, it's time for a refill! It's no use trying to get your horse clean with dirty water!

A Good Defense is the Best Offense

By having a thorough daily grooming routine, and getting your hands on all of your horse's parts, you'll keep ahead of winter skin irritations and other "cooties", as well as keeping apprised of your horse's weight and condition. Proper coat care during the winter will pay off come Springtime. Shedding out will be generally faster & easier, and the incoming coat will start off healthy and shiny!





Riding with Debbie McDonald

fter my plans for moving to Albion College were finalized, I her, watched her teach and ridden with her that she is such an began exploring riding and showing opportunities. One day while I was searching the Albion College website, I noticed that two-time Olympian Debbie McDonald was going to give a symposium on Connection from September 19-20, 2009 at the Nancy G. Held Equestrian Center at Albion College. I thought that it would be a great opportunity and since Reggie and I would be at Albion anyway, I decided to apply for the symposium.

On Friday September 18th, Debbie flew into Detroit, Michigan all the way from Australia. In order to give Debbie a clear idea of what each of the 8 riders in the symposium would work on during their lessons on Saturday and Sunday, Debbie came out to have a casual dinner with the riders and watch all 8 riders school Friday evening. The riders, who were riding from training level to Grand Prix, each had different strengths and weaknesses which Debbie noted Friday evening. The 8 riders rode in groups of 4. with riders from

training to 3rd level in the first group and 3rd to Grand Prix in the second group. I rode in the second group and was thankful and impressed that all riders were courteous and focused about what was going on in the arena. As each rider began to cool down, Debbie would say a few words, regarding what each pair would be working on in the coming days. I truly believe allowing this time on Friday for Debbie to come out to Albion and watch the horse and rider pairs before the symposium started and all the auditors came, allowed Debbie to see each pair in a relaxing environment and notice what was happening (both good and bad) in each pair. Because of this, each rider and Debbie became more connected and therefore could work together Saturday and Sunday in a more united way.

Regardless of the level, Debbie designed lessons that helped correct weaknesses in horse and rider pairs, while emphasizing the necessity of a consistent connection. Her talent, wisdom and knowledge as a rider is evident by her international success with Brentina, as evident by their gold medal at the 1999 Pan American Games, along with team bronze at the 2004 Olympic Games and 2006 World Equestrian Games. In addition, the pair finished with an individual silver medal at the 2006 World Equestrian Games; and of course perhaps the pair's most memorable performance was their famous "Brick House" freestyle, which resulted in a third place finishing at the 2005 FEI World Cup in Las Vegas. I can also say, after having talked with

effective and positive coach. I was so impressed at the details she noticed in both horse and rider that she could not only identify, but aid each pair in correcting and improving. Debbie had a head set on that was broadcasted throughout the arena, barns and lounge areas. So no matter where anyone was at any particular moment, they could hear the lesson that was going on. This was such a great tool for both riders and auditors, as everyone could hear Debbie clearly, which allowed riders to be more accurate and allowed auditors to take notes and process Debbie's methodology clearly.

The format of the clinic was rather logical. The rides would begin at training level and throughout the day progress through the levels up to and including Grand Prix. After every two lessons (each lesson lasted 45 minutes), there would be a 10 minute question and answer session with Debbie. This time was an opportunity for auditors to ask Debbie about specific horse and rider pairs and why she did certain exercises with the pair or to just ask Debbie about anything (like her own experiences or saddle preference)! After the first 4 horse and rider pairs there was a lunch break, and then the final 4 horse and rider pairs rode.

I rode Reggie directly after the lunch break. Debbie helped me so much in terms of keeping Reggie straighter in every aspect of the ride. In every lesson, as she did in mine, Debbie showed how a constant connection, that was not too restrictive but at the same time not too loose, allowed a more unified and in sync horse and rider combination. With my horse, which is stiff in his neck, particularly in the right side, Debbie gave me exercises to loosen up his right side. Specifically, I would resort to haunches in right in the trot, if Reggie would come against



my rein within that gait. Then as soon as he loosened up, I gave the right rein, through a pat on the neck with my right hand. If I was on the left rein and he became resistant in the bridle, I would counter flex him and if that was not enough (which in the beginning of the ride was not), I counter bent him, so that I could achieve suppleness in my horse. Again as soon as he suppled his right side, I gave the right rein by a pat on the neck with my right hand. Throughout my lessons, regardless of whether I was focusing on maintaining the straightness in the flying changes and then tempis or the bend and crossing over of the hind legs in the half-pass, I as the rider had to maintain a consistent but yielding connection with my horse.

The lessons that I learned from Debbie were invaluable. I know

that the other 7 riders and over 200 auditors in attendance took away new exercises and different methods of working with their horses. The foundation of all of the issues in the horse and rider pairs depicted over the weekend was connection, primarily, how an overly restrictive connection can hinder a horse's desire to move forward or how a non-existent, floppy rein connection cannot possible give the horse any idea of the riders desires. If a rider wants to communicate with their horse there must be a constant existing connection, which does not restrict the horse in any way but gives and rewards when the horse responds correctly to the rider's aids.

The amount of effort cannot go unnoticed, which was required to put on this symposium. The level of professionalism conveyed by Debbie McDonald, George Halkett, Danielle Menteer, Carolyn Killewald, Albion College staff and volunteers, Sporthorse Saddlery and other venders was so impressive. The Nancy G. Held Equestrian Center is an immaculate facility, which made the experience for all in attendance so enjoyable. In addition, the amount of enthusiasm and appreciation that existed the whole weekend was wonderful and very rewarding. All in all, riding with Debbie McDonald was an opportunity, that I am so grateful I was able to experience!

Dansko Professional Clogs

he time came when my poor mudruckers were simply not going to see another day, so I made the decision to finally splurge and buy a pair of the famous Dansko clogs. Danskos are un-mistakenly the clog of choice with horse lovers alike. The choices are straightforward; pick the leather, the color, and the size. The size is a little odd, but for the most part, lining up your shoe size on the Dansko size chart gives an accurate reading for the required European measurement. The clogs are very well made, with high quality leather and quality construction that will stand up to the rigors of barn duties. Be careful, though, and do not plan to wear them for 10 hours the first day; it takes a few wears to adjust your feet to the design. Dansko clogs offer a lot of support to the foot, and initially there will be soreness, but I found that quickly diminished after a few wears. They will stretch and break in, so a (mildly) snug fit is appropriate in the beginning. Dansko leather also cleans up very well, and I have found a little bit of Effax cream-soap does wonders. Dansko also manufactures their own line of leather cleaner and polish. So far, I have no complaints, and for about \$100, Dansko's are a practical and ergonomic choice while at the same time looking smart and professional.






