## Your saddle pad could make the difference! By Carey Smith

t's that time of year. You feel it...dry scratchy skin, dry hair that stands on end with static electricity. Your horse feels it too and his coat really shows it especially after his winter clipping. Baths are all too few and far between and winter can be very hard on a horse's skin and coat. Blankets and saddle pads can make it much worse. Horse dander, horse hair and sweat build up after repeated use. It causes pilling in the fabric and rubs on the back. Dry clipped hair is particularly susceptible to this.

Saddle pads need to be washed regularly with mild detergent and rinsed thoroughly and checked periodically for rough or worn spots. (There are a number of special cleaners recommended by the pad manufacturers such as Melp, Egyss Blanket & Pad Wash, Leather Therapy Laundry Solution to name a few.) If the pad has rubbed spots or any sign of an uneven surface that doesn't wash out and "fluff"



Rubbed or balding spots on your horses back are

signs that something is not quite right. Of course it could be the saddle or possibly the blanket (we'll discuss those in a different article) but the saddle pad is an easy piece of the puzzle to check and replace if need be. You'll want to be sure your saddle pad is the correct shape for your sad-

dle and your horse. A pad contoured for the back which shapes up at the withers is always what I recommend. A poor quality



or poorly fitting pad can cause pressure soreness or painful rubbing across the withers or spine. A good pad should meet the following guidelines:

- It should have a High cut withers and should follow the curve of your horse's spine and fit into the gullet channel of the saddle.
- It should be large enough and match the shape of the saddle flaps.
- It should be long enough and wide enough that the saddle panels do not sit on the outer edges, seams or weltings.
- It should be completely even in consistency without lumps, bumps or wear or pilling on the underside (even the smallest grit can feel like a painful thorn after an hour's work).
- It will allow heat and moisture to wick away from the horse's back.

Unfortunately, there are some discomforts our horses experience during the winter months that are beyond our control but keeping them comfortable with a clean and functional saddle pad should not be one of them. The next time you pull your saddle off the rack and head to the cross ties stop for a moment to pull the saddle pad out from under and take a quick check. # Equestrian Stylista "Pilates for the Dressage Rider"

As a lover of fitness and yoga, I was thrilled when I received the "Pilates for the Dressage Rider" DVD as a gift. "Pilates for the Dressage Rider" is written by Janice Dulak, and comes in book form as well as a DVD. I was unaware of exactly what pilates was, and after a quick search found that pilates "... focuses on the core postural muscles which help keep the body balanced and which are essential to providing support for the spine". Basically speaking, pilates strengthen your core; the muscles in and surrounding your stomach and abdominals. In dressage, the core of the body is vital, as it helps us push from the seat, sit straight and tall, and actively move with the horse's movements.

I started the real time DVD on the beginner section. The DVD gives a thorough demonstration and explanation of each movement. The exercises focus on all areas of strengthening the body, but one theme remains-to keep the core engaged and regulate breathing. It is hard to do



all three at the same time! Once the "learning" segments are over, a 10 minutes real time workout is included, containing all of the exercises learned. After 3 weeks of "mastering" the beginner section, I decided it was time to try out the advanced section of the DVD. Similar in focus and format, the advanced exercises further stretch and strengthen your mus-

cles. Once again, at the end of the exercises is included a real time workout. Included in the DVD is also a mounted-exercises section, which I have not viewed or tried yet.



I have thoroughly adopted this habit of doing Pilates, and love that I feel the exercises working (sometimes in a sore way the next day!). If done carefully and slowly, pilates can help any rider become **stronger. "Pilates for the Dressage Rider"** is a fabulous way to start the program at home. I highly recommend it to all dressage riders, and those not involved in dressage, as well.



This show has been created to showcase and honor the horse with special emphasis upon understanding of the horse first. It is truly reflected in all aspects of this passionate show.

I had the privilege of seeing Cavalia this past winter in Miami. I drove from Orlando to Miami and return in the same day (10 hrs. of driving), just to see the show. It was definitely worth it! I was transformed by the majesty and beauty of what was before me. At a friend's insistence, I purchased the "Rendezvous" tickets which included an amazing pre-show buffet dinner, intermission desserts and a tour of the barns to meet "the stars" at shows end.

As horse people our expectations for shows involving horses are set pretty high. Cavalia actually surpassed my expectations. I never expected the natural stages, supreme footing, backdrops and props. The show began with colts and fillies running across the stage at liberty, becoming accustomed to the audience, smells, and noises. The show held an "At Liberty" act with gifted horsewoman, Syl-

> via Zerbini (an 8th generation circus trainer) and a host of white Iberian stallions interacting with her and each other. No two shows are ever the same! There is a Pas de Deux with two female riders, adorned in wedding-type dresses, that is mirror perfect. Also, surreal was the "Ball" act where a talented man is interfacing with a stallion while he is bouncing on a ball. It is nothing short of miraculous!

The show has acrobatics to make you gasp and trick riding that is stimulating and amazing. The music is haunting and enchanting, performed live with a full orchestra and an angelic-voiced soprano. Breathtaking and amazing can't describe each and every act and scene.

This show is simply too astonishing and astounding to even describe in words! The set up (a week's worth) is mind boggling with stage design, footing, and hightop tents. The care and attention to the welfare care, and grooming of the horses (more than 60!) is phenomenal.

You must see it or at the very least, visit www.cavalia.net to be treated to snippets of the show and some interesting commentary, music, and background. Cocreators, Frederic Pignon and Magali Delgado just released a fantastic book, detailing their love affair with the horse, entitled, Gallop to Freedom which is another horse "treat" and well worth reading. Cavalia is truly a tribute to the magic of the hrse and enchanting for every horse lover!

Editor's Note: I had the opportunity to go to the show when they were touring in Las Vegas in 2006. It was a truly amazing show and the VIP tickets were well worth the price. 

# Hurry Up and Wait By Cassandra Hummert-Johnson

It's 4:30 am. The dark room is shattered by the piecing sound of the small alarm clock. I blindly reach to turn it off, and the room is quieted except for the relentless hum of the air conditioner. The view from the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor window is dark, only spotted with occasional lights illuminating the hotel's parking lot below. It is going to be another hot day, the weather channel states, a high of 94. We grab our things and head down the hall, abandoning the room that we will not encounter for another 16 hours. The lobby is still; the desk simply has a note with a number to call in case of an emergency. There is free coffee sitting on the counter. It's horrible, and we mutually agree to make a stop at McDonalds's. Outside the July air is muggy, and the truck is coated in a layer of dripping condensation. We silently hope to ourselves that the day's heat will burn it off. We travel down the road as if driving through a ghost town, and pull into a nearby McDonalds where we are greeted by a groggy half-asleep teenager at the window. Armed with a morning dose of caffeine we continue our early morning drive to the show grounds.

As we pull into the driveway the sky is beginning to show hints of the day's arrival. We are stabled at the front of the complex, and park next to four identical white Ford F-350 duallys; the year's trend, originating from Florida. It has become a game in the mornings to sneak into the barn without the horses noticing. We guietly approach the open door to the silent barn and look in; the horses have their heads hung in front of their humming

fans, eyes closed, ears peacefully cocked, lower lips hanging. We flick on the light switch and the horses are brought to life out of their slumber, and begin to nicker eagerly for their breakfast. When we are done distributing hay, grain and water to the horses, dawn has broken, and the humidity recedes, replaced with hot, dry air. The time is 6:30 am. The horses are content, and quietly munch on their hay as we head to the show office to check for any changes to the schedule. The first ride of the day is at 7:00 am, and we pause at the side of the warm-up ring and watch a beautiful black gelding gracefully float over the sand, his rider guiding him through an effortless warm-up. We recall the horse's number, agreeing to watch for him during the weekend.

My ride time is at 9:23, and there is much to be done. When we arrive back to the stable, I put Rampal's halter on and begin braiding his mane. The barn is bustling now, with horses and riders getting ready to show. I braid quickly, twisting the segments of mane into a braid, and securing it into a little ball on the right side of Rampal's neck. Country western music is softly playing through the speaker system, and I monotonously continue, easily finishing 20 braids in about an hour. Laura and I decide to take our horses out for a quick walk, to let them stretch their legs and see the venue. Rampal is quiet as we walk the groomed path, occasionally turning with his ears forward to observe a deer off to the side of the arenas, or perhaps a young horse that is being lunged. When we arrive back to the barn I return Rampal to his stall and put his saddle and bridle on.

With Rampal ready to go I assemble what I need for myself, and last minute put on my coat and boots, grab my water and lead Rampal outside where I get on and walk over to the warm up.

The morning is heating up, but the early morning mist still hangs in the air. Rampal feels good, and he begins the snort softly; a sign that he's concentrating and fluid. The show ring is open, and it is time for our ride. The judges sit at a white painted gazebo at the end of the arena. The arena is brightly decorated with flowers, and the freshly raked footing is void of hoof prints. As we canter into the ring, we leave the first trail of our 6-minute journey.

The ride goes well, with no mistakes. We salute the judge for the final time, and I let my reins out and Rampal relaxes; stretching out his neck and we simultaneously breathe a sigh of relief. The time is 9:29, and it is nice to be done, as I can feel the heat radiating off Rampal, and sweat dripping down my forehead. He is hosed off and returned to his stall, where he stands; head pressed into the whirring box fan, eyes closed. With myself and my horse refreshed I walk to the show office, and see my score, which turns out to be my final qualifying score for the regional championships. The class had not finished, so I didn't know how I placed. Already exhausted, I walk back to the barn, where I give Rampal a carrot, and think for a moment how I am blessed with horses. It will be a while before the class ends and I get the results, so I pick up Three Cups of Tea and sit in a blue nylon folding chair, only to dose off peacefully; sharing the fan with my equally as tired horse.
