Northern Ohio Dressage Association Video Clinic Opportunity

ODA is pleased to announce an exciting new opportunity for Junior/Young Riders and Adult Amateurs to improve their skills by having their riding performance and horse's performance critiqued by Northeast Ohio professionals.

This program will be provided free to NODA Members and will consist of:

- Taping of horses and riders at either a USDF Recognized Show or NODA Schooling Show
- Your ride/test will then be reviewed with the clinicians
- The clinicians will then provide feedback, which would also be taped
- The taped ride and clinicians' responses will be combined to create a short educational clip of 15 – 30 minutes that will be posted on either the NODA website or YouTube
- A DVD will also be produced and distributed to the NODA train hunter/jumpers, eventers and dressage riders. Members selected to participate in this program

Since this is a new program for NODA, it will be piloted in March and April and we are pleased to announce:

- Taping will occur at the Lake Erie College Dressage
 Winter Series on March 17th and 18th and/or the LEC
 Prix de Villes March 31st and April 1st.
- The two professionals are from SendonWay Equestrian Center and Transitions Dressage LLC.

Lauren Ball-Tisdale and Nancy Lewis-Stanton will provide the critiques to a limited number of NODA JR/YR and/or Adult Amateurs. Please note JR/YR will be given preference in this clinic.



Nancy Lewis-Stanton began her amazing riding career at the age of 5. With a natural feel and genius for dressage, she trained her first horse Carrousel to Prix St. Georges by the age of 15 and competed him at Grand Prix before her 20th birthday. She competed on six North American Young Rider teams and won her first Team Gold Medal in 1985.

Nancy Lewis-Stanton and IdleHour Forio

Nancy and Izaiah were placed on the USET Developmental List in 1992, which gave the pair a chance to work with

some of the best trainers in the world, including Gunter Seidel, Robert Dover, George Williams, Jessica Ransenhousen, Harry Boldt and Team Coach Klaus Bakenhol. While in Germany, Nancy trained with the great Col. Von Ziegner. She has also attended numerous clinics with Conrad Schumacher, who has coached and trained a wide variety of Junior Young Riders.

In addition, Nancy and Izaiah won the USET Intermediare National Championships in 1993, they were the first alternate for the 1995 Pan Am Team, and were 17th in the country for the 1996 Olympics.

Nancy's approach stresses the basics, and she brings the horse and rider along at a pace best suited for their individual needs and capabilities. By never overfacing the horse and rider, but pushing them to do their best, Nancy gets the most out of her students. She has trained every type of horse, from recently broke babies to improving the seasoned Grand Prix horse. Her varied and extensive background has helped her train hunter/jumpers, eventers and dressage riders.

Nancy has earned her USDF Bronze, Silver and Gold Medals.

Lauren Tisdale is the owner and trainer of Transitions Dressage LLC based at Meridian Farm in Newbury, OH. She is a USDF Bronze and Silver Medalist and has also earned the Bronze Bar Freestyle Award. Lauren enjoys starting and developing young horses and bringing them up to the FEI levels of Dressage.

Lauren's students have had great success at the local, regional and national levels, from Training through I-1. In 2005, she was selected as a demonstration rider, with one of her young training horses, for the first-ever Young Dressage Horse Trainers Symposium run by Scott Hassler and has attended every symposium since then. Riding Charlotte Bayleys Hanoverian gelding, Lauren competed at the USEF/Markel National Young Horse Championships in 2008 and 2009, finishing 3rd in 2008. Age Related Change of Equine Dentition

he Equine tooth is in a constant state of change throughout a horse's life. Annual dental exams and floats can help to monitor these changes and help to ensure proper development is occurring. Horses can be divided into three different populations, based on age and dental requirements: the young horse age 0-5yrs., the middle aged horse age 5-18 yrs., and the geriatric horse age 18 + yrs.

The Young Horse (0-5 yrs.)

A horse in this age group will erupt and lose 24 deciduous (baby) teeth and will gain up to 44 permanent teeth. Because of this activity, many of these horses will experience some issue that will lead to oral discomfort and require the use of a qualified equine dentist. It is recommended that the horses in this population be checked every six months to insure that deciduous teeth are being shed at proper intervals. Retained deciduous teeth can lead to the formation of painful eruption cysts or even redirection of the permanent teeth. Starting at the age of 4 months a foal should have routine dental exams every six months. In the first exam, special care must be taken to determine if a foal is developing an overbite or "parrot mouth". Early detection of this abnormality is crucial to the amount of success you will have treating it. By two years of age, or before training begins, a horse should have a routine dental float including removal of wolf teeth if present. Many horses in the 2 -5 yr. range may need floating every six months. Dental floating for horses less then two years of age is recommended if problems arise.

Middle Aged Horse (5-18yrs)

Unless otherwise specified horses in this age group will require annual dental exams and floats. The majority of procedures will involve the removal of sharp enamel points, monitoring and correction of malocclusions of the teeth and the reduction of minor overgrowths. Annual dental exams and floats at this stage are the best possible way to ensure the longevity of your horse's teeth.

The Geriatric Horse (18+ yrs.)

The majority of problems seen in the geriatric horse population involve overgrowths and the loss of reserve crown. Overgrowths restrict the normal motion of the jaw during mastication (chewing) and will cause excessive wear on opposing teeth. Loss of reserve crown is a factor that no amount of dental care can fix. Reserve crown of a horses tooth can be thought of as the growth center of the tooth. With age, this growth center diminishes steadily until the tooth can no longer grow. How long the reserve crown lasts is unique to each tooth. Once a tooth runs out of reserve crown, the opposing tooth will continue to grow and many times will exert excessive forces on this already weakened tooth. The goal of the float at this point is to reduce the teeth that are causing excessive pressures in order to take them out of contact with the weakened tooth.

Routine and thorough dental exams and floats by a qualified equine dentist are an integral part of your horses' overall health at all stages of their lives.



2010 Young Dressage Star Spotlight Tour

ermany has always been at the equestrian forefront, with breeding and sport benefiting from each other. It's not just breeding that makes a good dressage horse. It takes a consistent system of education to mold a balanced, happy and correct dressage athlete. In Germany such a system was, and still is, in place, with many thousands of participants and instructors, following the guidelines of The German Scale of Training, the consecutive steps of educating horses in a proper way, teaching them the right lessons at the right time.

I was fortunate to see proof of this, in the flesh, on a recent trip to Germany. In July of 2010, I received the exciting news that I was one of six people chosen to participate in the first ever Young Dressage Star Spotlight Tour. This trip was the brainchild of Reisa Bonetti of Dressage Training Online (www.dressagetrainingonline.com) and Scott Hassler, the USEF National Young Horse Coach. Unbeknownst to me, I had been anonymously nominated to be a candidate. After reading about the program, I was very hopeful to be chosen for such a once in a lifetime trip. I was thrilled when I got the letter that I, along with five other dressage professionals, would be traveling to Warendorf, Germany in September to watch the 2010 Bundeschampionate, the German National Young Horse Championships.

In selecting the chosen six, Reisa and Scott looked for trainers and riders that had a special interest in and experience working with and competing young horses, especially on a national level. One of their goals of this trip was to give us exposure to the training, riding and competing of some of the best young horses in the world, and what it takes to make it to the top.

The Bundeschampionate is a five day long competition for young, German bred horses and ponies competing in Dressage, Jumping, Driving or Eventing. The event is held at the DOKR (Deutsche Olympiade Komitee fur Reiterei) the German Olympic Training Center in Warendorf, Germany.



The DOKR is where riders on the German team, or those contending to be, may come to train at a top notch facility that provides them with every possible "arena" to ride in. It has lovely dressage arenas, a fantastic cross country course, large arenas for jumping and two expansive indoor arenas. The DOKR is also home to the FN, their National Federation, much like our own USEF.

This is an amazing place, almost like a village of horses, stables and arenas. Nestled by clumps of deep forest, there are beautiful dressage and stadium jumping arenas that are hugged closely by seating for spectators, judge's stands and flowers everywhere. Winding through the forest, are beautifully manicured paths that lead you from one arena to the next and rows and rows of vendors.

Although we arrived at the Bundeschampionate a few days after it had started, we were able to see the most anticipated classes, the Finals. At this championship, 3, 4, 5 and 6 year old stallions, mares and geldings compete. Most of the horses are competing in only one discipline, but some will compete in two. Given that such a large number of horses qualify for the Championships, there are a few classes that they have already competed in to narrow down the groups that ultimately compete in the Final classes, awarding the National Champion for that division. Our group's main focus was to watch the Dressage, although we did catch a few jumping classes. When seeing such a large number of young, high quality and impeccably bred horses, it's hard to pull yourself away from the Dressage arena! We were very fortunate to have Scott along on this trip as he is good friends with and knows quite a number of Germanys top coaches, trainers and young horse riders. Scott arranged for us to sit with some of the coaches while classes were going on as well as meet with one of the judges in between classes he was judging. Ulf Moeller is highly respected as one of Germanys top young horse handlers, riders and trainers. He is well

known for his partnership with the stallion Sandro Hit. Ulf took some time away from his busy schedule coaching students, including his wife Eva who was competing, to talk with us about the breeding, training and competing of horses with such quality and at the national level. Ingo Pape also spent some time with us when he wasn't coaching his wife Susan on the horse she was competing. It was incredible that these extremely busy, highly regarded professionals took the time to sit with us and happily answer the number of questions we presented to them!

When we the competition was done each day, Scott and Reisa had arranged for us to attend some private training and sales barns, one of which was the stable of PSI. Performance Sales International is owned by Mr. Kassleman and Mr. Schockemöhle, the stable that most recently purchased the legendary stallion Totilas. We were invited into Mr. Kasslemans home on the evening of the final day of the Bundeschampionate. It was a bit surreal as we sat and had dinner with top riders, trainers and much of the staff of PSI. Everyone was incredibly friendly and excited to have us as their guests. They were all celebrating a very successful Bundeschampionate! The next morning, Ulf invited us back to PSI to observe some training sessions of some of their young sales horses as well as tour the lovely, historic stables.

In addition to our visit to PSI, we were also invited to spend the morning with Michael Klimke, son of the late Dr. Reiner Klimke and brother to German eventing star, Ingrid Klimke. At Turnierstall Kilmke, we were able to see first hand how Michael runs his stable and daily training sessions. A practicing attorney, Michaels morning are focused on the training of his dressage horses before heading into the office. All of his horses are warmed up outside on a ½ mile track, where they walk and trot on a long rein, most of the time by his groom, before they head into the arena for more focused, intensive training. We admired this approach, especially for the young horses. The FEI level horses benefit from this greatly as well as it keeps them supple and fresh.

On our final day in Germany, we had the privilege of touring the Westphalian State stud. This is a state owned centre where legendary stallions live and riders may come to earn their licensing. We were able to tour through all of the stables as well as see 24 stallions practicing for an up coming "stallion parade" where they were going to be showcased. The most amazing thing about these stallions was that they were being ridden in tandem. One man would be riding while long lining another stallion in front of him. All 24

stallions were in the arena at the same time, it was crazy! Amazingly, they all behaved and the riders had control at all times!

Last, but certainly not least, we ate, a lot! The food was amazing and I was not shy to sample the German cuisine (and maybe a few beers!).

Now I think I know where the Germans get their strong riding positions from, eating plenty of Bratwurst and Wiener schnitzel!

I had an amazing time and have a great new group of friends as a result of this trip. We were very passionate about the trip and absorbed every little piece of information we could about the history of breeding, approach to training and what it takes to make a champion. We hope, as riders and trainers, to share what we experienced with our students and horses.
