In Memoriam

Major Anders Lindgren has passed away at 85 years of age. A former cavalry officer and member of the Swedish Olympic team, his influence upon so many riders and instructors in the U.S. has been profound. His insight, patience, and wit, along with his love and respect for the horses touched hundreds of us and redirected our riding lives. Major Lindgren was a 2003 USDF Hall of Fame Inductee.

Major Lindgren was a HUGE presence in NODA's past. Many long-time NODA members participated in the instructors' seminars NODA sponsored. These

seminars attracted dressage instructors from all over. He taught many of our best instructors how to teach, how to do lesson plans, how to lunge properly and how to long line. He taught them riding and teaching theory, and how to appreciate their responsibility for the welfare of the horse and the sport. Major Lindgren conducted clinics at Dagmar Zimmerman's farm, and later at Liberty Bell Stables. Many of our local professionals rode in his clinics and attended his lectures. NODA members who had the privilege of working with him absorbed as much as they could every time he came. He was a mentor to many NODA members.

USDF Announces Dressage Tests iPhone App

December 22, 2010 (Lexington, KY) - The United States Dressage Federation (USDF), in cooperation with Numen Communications, has released the first version of the new 2011 USDF Introductory tests in a downloadable iPhone application.

Each test allows the user to read the test instructions along with the judging criteria; review dressage arena diagrams that animate through the movements within a test; play and record your own readings of the test that are perfectly timed for an individual horse and the arena in which you are practicing; reference the official USDF dressage test sheet; review the USDF Pyramid of Training; and keep up-to-date on the latest in dressage competition through the USDF news feed.

The iPhone application has been developed for USDF Introductory Level Test A, USDF Introductory Level Test B, and USDF Introductory Level Test C. 

Routine Dental Exam and Float

he routine dental exam and float should consist of three basic parts. These are a thorough history, a comprehensive float, and evaluation of the float.

The History

A thorough history is essential to analyzing the needs of each individual horse. Each float begins with the veterinarian asking some basic questions about why they were called out to look at a patient. For example, is this a routine float or is this horse resisting the bit or having difficulty eating? For a routine float I would want to know when the horse was floated last, if a full mouth speculum was used, if motorized or hand floats was used etc. If there is a problem being addressed, I would need to know if the horse is not eating certain feeds, if the horse is balling up hay, or if there has there been a history of fever or nasal discharge, etc. The next step is to palpate the teeth. Palpation is used to assess the sharpness of the teeth, determine if the horse is showing signs of oral pain, and to evaluate the motion of the jaw. The last step of the exam is a visual exam of the mouth to assess sharp points, overgrowths and ulcerations of oral tissues.

The Float

The goal of the float is to identify and correct any abnormalities in the mouth in a safe and effective manner, while causing minimal stress to the patient. I routinely sedate horses for all procedures to ensure safety, minimize resistance, and allow the veterinarian to do a thorough and adequate float.

Once the horse is sufficiently sedated, the mouth is rinsed and a full mouth speculum is put in place. A full mouth speculum is an apparatus which holds the mouth open and allows a clear view of the mouth. This type of speculum is the safest to use because it dissipates the forces of holding the mouth open over many teeth. Next the horse's head is placed on a padded head stand. I feel a head stand is best because it eliminates the need for the owner to hold the head up, which can be very strenuous and dangerous. The head stand also allows the horse to hold their head in a comfortable position. The horse is not restrained by the stand and can back up away from it at any time throughout the procedure. Once the horse is sufficiently sedated with the speculum in place and their head on the head stand, the exam begins. Sharp points, overgrowths, and imbalances, etc. are easily identified with the help of a very bright head light. Once the evaluation is complete the float begins. I use motorized equipment for all my floats. The motorized float allows me to do all procedures in a precise and effective manner, while minimizing trauma to the mouth.

After the Float

It is important to asses the function of the horses mouth following a float. Manipulating the jaw tells me if the teeth are grinding effectively with no resistance. Visually you can tell if the teeth are in balance and if reductions were sufficient. I consider pain or difficulty eating after the routine float to be abnormal. The vast majority of my patients will go back to eating as soon as they wake up from sedation.

What Horses Have Done for Me

I'm sure my story would not interest "The Today Show" audience, but maybe those of you in NODA will find it entertaining. My name is Kimber Mackenzie. I started riding when I was 8 years old on school horses. My mom finally broke down and bought me my own horse at age 13, a grade mare with no special breeding, the most beautiful horse I had ever seen. We jumped, went trail riding, and started in dressage and eventing, about four or five shows at best.

My riding career was cut short when it was time to go to college. I did join the OSU Equestrian team, hunters mostly, but when I went to veterinary school, horseback riding had to stop to allow time for the rigorous studying that was required.

I began practicing veterinary medicine and discovered that it took many hours of commitment. I loved my profession, but I began to feel riding at a competitive level was no longer in the cards for me.

In 2001 I found myself drawn to some horse people. They put me on a horse and insisted that I ride. My dear friend Cathy and my friend, client, and generous trainer Mary Jane Moore just wouldn't take, "No I'm just too busy" for an answer. It is a hunter barn, so when I found myself a proud owner of a racing thoroughbred I started in hunters. In 2002 I had my beautiful daughter. My riding career was derailed again, but I persevered and found my way back to riding as soon as I could.

In 2006, at a hunter show, we were doing a roll back and

heading for a 2'9" fence in our fourth jumping class when we crashed into the fence. My poor horse sent me sailing through the air, hitting the ground hard enough to separate my shoulder, break ribs, rupture a lung, and bruise my kidneys. At the hospital they found that I had kidney cancer. I was able to be cured with surgery. Now I look at my horse and see my guardian angel. After another less traumatic fall, I admitted that the demands at work and at home did not permit me to ride enough for the strength to jump safely.

We had to find a new job. This brought us to dressage in the spring of 2009. We entered our first show in November 2009. What fun! What a welcoming environment, peaceful compared to the hunter shows! Horses tearing around, people calling out fences, look out! We have continued to show this year and met some of the most wonderful people. At 44, I found myself qualifying for a championship -- what a surprise. My daughter told me she was proud of me (she is 8). We have had a great year!

Riding first gave me something to do to stay out of the normal teenage traps. Next, riding gave me the self confidence that I could be anything I wanted to be. Riding has since given me some of the best friends I could ever want. Riding has recently given me good health and the opportunity to be cured and stay healthy. And now riding has given me a vocation my horse and I love, with people we can't wait to get to know better.

Thanks to all of you that make this happen: To NODA officers, volunteers, riders, and stables that do all the work to have these shows. You make some of us feel like little girls (and boys) again.





Fall Wellness Exam

ongratulations to everyone that won an end of season be done under sedation with a bright light and an oral Championship ribbon or trophy! It was wonderful to see everyone dressed up at the NODA banquet. Now that show season is over for those of us not lucky enough to be heading to Florida, it is the time for a Fall Wellness Exam. This is the best time to reflect on the past season and make plans for the winter training session.

A physical exam should be scheduled to address any health concerns that have developed over the past year. Auscultation of the heart, lungs, and GI tract should be performed. If any pesky lumps have developed, now is the time for them to be checked and removed.

Vaccinations are essential for the complete health of the horse. Consult your veterinarian to determine the vaccines required by each horse on an individual basis.

A fecal egg count should be performed at least 60 days after the last de-wormer has been administered. The fecal egg count will determine the need to de-worm, if the current dewormer is effective, and help the veterinarian develop a deworming strategy designed specifically for your horse and property.

An oral exam should be performed. A good oral exam should

speculum. The sharp points on the molars can be "floated" equilibrated if needed and hooks can be reduced.

A CBC profile (complete blood count) and fibrinogen blood work can be drawn to fully evaluate your horse's health. The CBC looks for anemia, infection, inflammation and low platelets. A profile will evaluate liver enzymes, kidney function, and overall electrolyte and protein values. Fibrinogen levels help to assess the overall inflammation state present within the horse.

Now is the time to look into any subtle lameness or gait abnormality. Early intervention may correct or cure a problem. Radiographs, ultrasound and MRI are advanced diagnostics that can be utilized to pinpoint lameness.

Joint injections, joint supplements and injections of joint protective substances such as Adequan or Legend may improve your horse's comfort and allow him to perform at a higher level.

Using all the information from the Fall wellness Exam we can start evaluating a training program to prepare for next season. Hopefully we will all be recipient of a Championship ribbon next year!
