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3rd Annual Dressage Retreat at Equistride International: Part II

Lessons with Mette Rosencrantz

ette is a two-time member of the Swedish National Dressage Team and has a dynamic yet methodical approach when teaching. In addition to Mette's long list of experience as a High Performance rid-

er, Mette is a gifted teacher. Mette was the youngest rider to be admitted to Strömsholm, Sweden's prestigious school for instructors, and eventually became the head dressage instructor there in 1980. Mette has been in the U.S. for nearly 2 decades now, and provides top-level instruction for horses and riders of all levels.

I cannot describe how great Mette is to ride under and watch instruct. She frequently uses humor to lighten up a bad moment in the ride. For example, as I watched rides she would say, "Oh *Susie*, you are so cute, but you are doing nothing up there". What I appreciate about Mette is that she has strict standards for professionals as well as amateurs. Many other upper level riders were taken back to 20 and 10-meter circles because their horses were not going on two tracks. In Mette's mind, if your horse is not going correctly on a 10 meter circle (or the rider is not riding it correctly) the rider cannot go out of that and leg yield or half-pass correctly.

Mette told many participants, including one of my students, who rode her 4-year-old KWPN gelding, "Ride him better; so you can make him better." She would also tell riders to ride the horse the way you want him to go (rather than the pre-

sent not-so-great way the horse wanted to go). A couple amateur riders got a wake-up call that they need to be more effective in the saddle so that they could improve their horse's way of going. In all the tactful instruction given by Mette, she imparted humor to keep the atmosphere light, which prevented a rider leaving frustrated. So with that said, here are a couple exercises we worked on with my horse.

One exercise was from quarter-line to three quarter-line riding a correct ten-meter circle to half-pass. If I was tracking left, I would come down the quarter-line and make a 10-meter circle left, then half pass left to the three quarter-line. I would then ride straight, come down the next quarter-line and repeat the exercise to the right. After that was good, I rode a 10 meter circle left from the quarter-line to half-pass left to the three quarter-line to a 10 meter circle right on the three quarter-line to half pass right to the quarter-line.

Another exercise we worked on to improve the extended canter was to go extended canter once I came out of the short-end and straightened until I was halfway down the long side, collect for a stride or two at B or E then immediately extend until the end of the long side where I would collect for a stride or two. Once my

horse was quick at this exercise on both reins, I rode extended canter down the entire long side of the arena. While this exercise was not complicated, it emphasized how quick off your aids your horse must be and how much power has to

exist to extend throughout the entire long side and only collect for a stride or two at the very end.

In everything that we did from tempi changes to half-pass, Mette would tell me to ride for an 8. Riding the best you can and improving the horse you are on was continually stressed. The balance between Mette and Susan is ideal and gives riders and auditors a great set of tools to take home with them and build on. Sharon Lewis and Ghardener Region 2 Champions in the Second Level Freestyle

haron Lewis and Ghardener (Ghard), a 17.2 hand, 6 year old Chestnut Hanoverian out of Gold Luck/West Indies are enjoying their recent successes at the Region 2 Dressage Championships; taking the blue in the Second Level Freestyle Championship class; a third place finish in the Second Level AA Championship; and a Fourth Place ribbon in the Third Level AA Championship. They have competed in three regional finals to date but Sharon admits she still gets "extremely ex-

cited and nervous before Championship rides." With all the hard work and time that goes into the sport of dressage Sharon shares, "you hope you've prepared enough...but there's nothing like the feeling when your ride goes well and you come out of the ring to see your parents, friends, and family with big smiles on their faces, cheering for you!" Family is very important to Sharon Lewis.

Sharon always wanted to follow in her "big sister's footsteps" doing all the things her big sister did, so Sharon rode most of her childhood and young adult life in Illinois where she was raised. Big sister is trainer, Nancy Lewis Stanton who has been coaching

Sharon since she was a teenager.
Nancy has always been her "biggest influence...I have always aspired to be half the rider she is. She is simply amazing." Sharon's parents Bernie and Bob Lewis purchased her first horse when she was 10 years old. Sharon trained her second horse, Wred Wrum to the Intermediare level by the time she was 20. She competed on two Young Rider Teams in the early 90's winning two team gold medals and one individual gold. Around that time Sharon's family

moved to Ohio, but Sharon stayed behind in Illinois and focused on her career leaving horses aside for about a decade. In 2004 when Sharon moved to Ohio to be closer to her family, "the 'horse' bug hit me right away." In 2005 Sharon bought Gharden-

er as a weanling thinking she would "start back slowly and enjoy a horse without the stress of going to competitions...it didn't work out that way." Sharon broke Ghard and with help from Nancy she put Ghard into a regular work program as she regained her riding skills. In 2008 she and Ghard went to their first show together and "there was

no looking back after that!"

Sharon boards Ghard at her family's stable, SendonWay Equestrian Center in Chardon, Ohio where Ghard enjoys turnout on grass pastures and a stall with dutch doors. She teaches Ghard tricks like bowing and Ghard loves his "scratchies." Sharon says "the boarders know to stand in front of his stall and when (Sharon) scratches Ghardener, he will give the person in front of him a massage." Sharon free jumps Ghard and he plays with a large ball in the arena to keep him mentally

fresh while maintaining his training. She is careful about equipment and tack and recently discovered how much difference the right saddle with a good fit can make to performance. Sharon credits Nancy with her success with Ghard saying "Nancy can watch you for only a few minutes and quickly find out what you're doing wrong...when I'm struggling with Ghardener or

really frustrated, she will get on him." When Nancy isn't available for lessons, their father, Bob Lewis pitches in and provides eyes on the ground. Bob has attended nearly every clinic and show the sisters have ever attended and he tirelessly selects all the freestyle music for the horses at SendonWay. Sharon's dedication in developing Ghard physically and mentally paid off as the team danced to strains of Neil Diamond playing over the loud speakers at the 2011 Region 2 Dressage Championships. Sharon is very proud that she and Ghardener

put in a nearly flawless freestyle ride, besting even professionals in the class to earn the blue neck ribbon.

Debi and Aragorn braved the weather and the warm-up to place 9th out of thirty five horse and rider pairs

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Using Equine Massage Techniques to Prevent Potential Colic

A demonstration by Angela Rahn

utumn is colic time in Northeast Ohio and the annual NODA business meeting program 'Using Equine Massage Techniques to Prevent Potential Colic' provided information equestrian caretakers can use when a horse just doesn't act right or the Vet is on the way for a suspected colic.

Angela Rahn, a 2010 graduate of the Equissage program in Virginia taught by founder, Mary Schrieber, provided an overview of the Equissage massage sequence developed for aiding in relaxation during colic. Rahn likes "hands on healing" and feels Sports Massage, as well as Reiki, fit in with her spiritual beliefs and way of approaching horsemanship. Rahn says, "I know hands on treatment can

help tired muscles and help with movement anytime. The benefits of massage in mild colic are relaxation and increased circulation."

Rahn demonstrated the Colic Massage Sequence, which flowed from a trigger point on the neck to the back, ribs, the abdomen, and finally to the croup. The sequence is then repeated on the other side of the horse. A variety of massage strokes and the correct application of pressure point treatment were reviewed. When applying pressure point treatment to an area Rahn started with light pressure, then totally released the pressure, then used a moderate pressure in the same spot and totally released the pressure and then reapplied pressure on the same area with heavy pressure counting 8—15 seconds for each application. Each horse is different and the practitioner must rely on the horse to guide the amount of pressure used.

Rahn stressed safety and good body mechanics for the practitioner at all stages of the sequence. For instance Rahn reminded us to keep one hand on the horse's thigh while massaging the ribs, abdomen, back, and croup in case the horse kicks out. Rahn considers the Colic Massage Sequence applicable when a



horse has symptoms of colic but does not insist on lying down and is not too frantic to stand still or its movement is not unsafe for the practitioner. She also reiterated several times that you should al-

ways follow the direct orders of your Vet when addressing colic or any illness. Massage should be avoided when a horse has a fever. Rahn answered questions and provided good hands on opportunity for those participants interested in trying out the massage strokes and the full sequence. Posters outlining the Colic Massage Sequence that are handy to have hanging in a prominent area in the barn were available for purchase at a cost of \$18.00. Rahn closed with goodie bags for our equine buddies!

Lendon Gray Announced as 2011 Roemer Foundation/USDF Hall of Fame Inductee

Lexington, KY (October 18, 2011) - The United States Dressage Federation (USDF) is pleased to announce that Lendon Gray will be inducted into the Roemer Foundation/USDF Hall of Fame (HOF) at the Salute Gala and Annual Awards Banquet, on December 2, 2011, during the Adequan/USDF Annual Convention in San Diego, CA. Induction into the HOF is an honor bestowed on horses and individuals that have made outstanding contributions to the sport of dressage in the U.S.

Lendon Gray has made a significant impact through many facets of the sport. As an international rider, she has represented the U.S. in the Alternate Olympic Games of 1980, the Seoul Olympics in 1988, and the 1991 World Cup in Paris. Nationally, Lendon has won five gold medals at U.S. Olympic Festivals on five different horses of varying breeds, one of whom was 2005 USDF Hall of Fame inductee Seldom Seen, a 14.2 hand American-bred Thoroughbred/Connemara pony. As a teacher and instructor, Gray has provided an array of educational and competitive opportunities for youth through Dressage4Kids, which is Lendon's non-profit organization that provides educational and competitive opportunities for youth riders and the adults who support them. To that end, Lendon, through Dressage4Kids operates the Youth Dressage Festival, weekend educational programs, pony-only clinics, the East Coast Dressage Pony Cup, and offers scholarships and professional development programs. Gray has been actively involved in numerous committees within USDF, the United States Equestrian Federation and the United States Equestrian Team. Through her dedication and devoted energies in improving all riders and horses, Lendon has and continues to provide numerous opportunities for others to learn and improve.

This year's conference will focus on Mr. Hess' philosophy that perfection in the basic training of horse and rider, at each level, leads to success at Grand Prix. These trainers' conferences, hosted by USDF, allow FEI – level trainers and other individuals who meet the attendee criteria to see training techniques and interact with a world class dressage trainer.

Born in 1950 in Delmenhorst, Germany, Mr. Hess has a long history of involvement in equestrian sport. During his time at university, he was involved in several equestrian study groups, and in the establishment of the riding group at the University Oldenburg. In addition, he has competed in dressage up to Advanced Test and show jumping and eventing up to Medium Advanced. Mr. Hess first became involved with the German National Federation in 1978 as Assistant in the Training Department and has gone on to his current role as the Director of Training for the German Olympic Committee for Equestrian Sports. Mr. Hess has worked on many video projects, is a prolific author, and continues to conduct clinics, workshops, forums, and symposiums for riders, trainers, and judges worldwide.

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

NODA Member Michael Fletcher's Translation Legacy By Sharon Coon

ong-time NODA member Michael Fletcher of Novelty passed away on February 13, 2011 after a brief illness. He spent many years studying classical riding, forging friendships with students and scholars of the Dressage Masters. During this journey Michael was searching for a way to make a positive difference for others. He found that passion just a couple years ago, as he began translating some of the great classical dressage works from French to English for Xenophon Press.

Intelligent, kind, caring and compassionate, Michael's love for the art of riding was probably perpetuated by his daughter Amy's time in the saddle. A graduate of Lake Erie College, In a Amy is a dressage trainer in Maryland and remained the light of Michael's life until his death. Anyone who knows Amy certainly sees her father's passion for the scholarship of classical intedressage in her own work.

Michael grew up in Montreal, Canada. Due to his mixed ancestry, his mother was French and his father was not, and the political climate of the time, he ended up attending English school while living in the midst of French culture. When he left at age 18, he was barely comfortable speaking French and then only after a cocktail or two. After a brief stint in the Canadian Army and a work assignment in Labrador, Michael's work with computers brought him to Cleveland in 1966. At age forty after watching his daughter ride for six months, Michael started taking lessons himself. A couple of years later,

when working on assignment in Columbus, he discovered dressage which he actively pursued and studied for the next 26 years. Partly due to his heritage, he was drawn to French equitation in particular and made that his intense study for the last ten years of his life. Re-teaching himself French with the goal of producing these translations was in the end an incredibly healing process.

Michael's first translation, published last October, Methodical Dressage of the Riding Horse by Faverot de Kerbrech (1837-1905) is considered the 'Bible of Baucherism'. In this book, Kerbrech, one of Baucher's favorite students, provides the definitive description and explanation of Baucher's second manner. Also included in this volume is Dressage of the Out-

<u>door Horse</u> in which General de Lagarenne gives us the last teaching of Faverot de Kerbrech.

Michael's second translation, <u>Dressage in the French Tradition</u> by Dom Diogo de Bragranca, long-time student of Nuno Oliveira, is a reference for the understanding of classical dressage, in which the horse ridden with the greatest impulsion and lightness, displays his maximum activity in response to the minimum effort of the rider. Copies have been pre-selling on the internet for the last few months and are now available.

In a press release announcing its publication, Major Miguel Tavora said of the translation, "Michael did a very accurate translation without distorting the sense of what the author intended to express, which is rare in the translations of equestrian books. Also as with the previous books, Michael was careful and clear in explaining the meaning of French words that don't have direct translation to English. Thank you Michael for all of your hard work."

Additionally, Xenophon Press has also just released Michael's third translation, <u>Baucher and his School</u> by General Decarpentry (1878-1956). Although a controversial figure both during his lifetime and ever since, Francois Baucher (1796-1873) made a lasting historical impact on the course of dressage development. This book includes the equestrian biography of Baucher, objective analysis of his method and its evolution,

and its lasting effect on French equitation. Sadly, Michael found the passion he sought only in the last couple years of his life. However, his translations for Xenophon Press of works never before available in English will benefit generations of riders.

A beautiful celebration of Michael Fletcher's life was held on Saturday, June 18, 2011 at Rainbow Ridge Farm, owned by Ron and Cheryl Chernicky, where he lived for 10 years. NODA member Caroline Berg-Redmond, long-time friend of Amy, rode a musical tribute to Michael aboard Dancing Preston, to Ian & Sylvia's versions of "CC Rider", "Old Blue", "Un Canadien Errant" and "V'la L'Bon Vent." It was a fitting tribute to the man who loved dressage and found a way to share his passion for Dressage with others through scholarship.



Firecracker: the July Fourth Foal that Made Dreams Come True

have tried to write the story of Firecracker as I know it. The first part is what I had been told throughout the years about how Firecracker was born and raised while the second part is of my own recall as his groom working for Charlotte Bayley. I became a part of his life after I admired Charlotte and Firecracker from afar; ok I idealized them from afar, and followed their career through the levels. All the while wishing I could train with Charlotte. This wish came true and my love of Firecracker blossomed into a new career with Charlotte Bayley and into managing CSB Dressage, LLC. My name is Lynn May and I was Firecracker's groom from October 17, 2000 through October 2009.

Fourth of July night, 1990, just half mile north of the Geauga Lake Amusement Park, a miracle was happening. At a small

breeding farm in Aurora, Ohio, Hilltop Laurner, a Percheron mare, was preparing to give birth to her first foal. Just before midnight, during the fireworks display at Geauga Lake, 2 ladies, Bettye and Ann, stood ready to catch the

arriving colt. Into their waiting arms came Firecracker. Between the two of them they had decided on two names, Fireworks if a filly and Firecracker if a colt. Firecracker came into this world with an explosive determination to succeed. Bettye and Ann's adventure as Warmblood owner's had begun.

Ann and Bettye watched over their colt as he grew, and grew. The two ladies were close friends as well as Bettye being a homecare nurse for Ann, who had been diagnosed with cancer. The two ladies put their heads together to come up with a direction for the career path of their now 2-year-old gelding. After going to watch different styles of riding and driving, different trainers and facilities, a plan of action was conceived. They were mesmerized by the beauty and athleticism of dressage and Charlotte Bayley-Schindelholz as a trainer. Ann and Bettye approached Charlotte to break and train their dressage horse, Firecracker. Being interested, Charlotte started asking the usual questions, age, experience etc. Finding out that he was only a

two year old she suggested that they wait a year or so to allow him to finish growing. Bettye pulled Charlotte aside and told her that Ann was diagnosed with cancer and did not have much longer to live. Her one dream was to see Firecracker under saddle as a dressage horse, and to possibly ride him. Charlotte being very moved by the story agreed to take on the project. Ann's cancer progressed faster than expected and her dream of riding was fading fast. Charlotte was able to train Firecracker to walk teeny tiny steps so that Ann could walk him while seated in her wheelchair. As time edged nearer, Ann was also able to feed Firecracker carrots out of her lap while sitting in a vehicle. After Ann's death, Bettye Ferguson became the sole owner of Firecracker. Firecracker, affectionately known as "Fire" to his close family of friends, continued his education in dressage. Determined to continue Fire's training, Bettye worked a fulltime job at Hillcrest Hospital to pay his expenses. Charlotte continued to train Firecracker and it was obvious that a true relationship was developing between horse and rider. Fire had enormous talent for being the offspring of a Thoroughbred father and Percheron mother. He had natural abilities that other trainers dreamed of and he offered them willingly. The time had come for Fire to compete at his first competition. He was entered in Training level division of dressage. Firecracker wowed everyone and won everything. This was just the beginning in the showing career for Fire. Firecracker would continue on that same year to win many local and national championships.

Firecracker's training had progressed far enough that Bettye was now able to get on him and ride around the farm. These were

wonderful days for Bettye, knowing that a very proud Ann was watching from above. Firecracker was never alone, as Ann was always with him, protecting him as his guardian angel. Bettye often had foster children living with her and her husband. They often visited Firecracker and took pony rides, being led around the farm by Bettye. Then along came her grandchildren. Bettye had supreme joy in bringing her grandchildren to the farm to see Firecracker training with Charlotte. But, please don't forget the pony rides for her grandchildren. It was nothing to

see Firecracker walking around the farm with not one, but 3 kids

on him at once. He was a very proud horse and showed it by taking very good care of his companions. He always remembered the teeny tiny steps he was taught by Charlotte as a 2 year old. Firecracker's success in the dressage competition ring blossomed even more as the years passed by. Every year Fire was winning a National Championship with the United States Dressage Federation (USDF) at his current level. As Firecracker got older, he got lighter in color. He went from a black colt, to a dapple-gray gelding and became a very handsome white show horse with a gray mane and tail. Quite stunning to watch as Charlotte and Fire danced across the many dressage arenas. As part of Firecracker's competition and training, Charlotte started riding in Musical Freestyles. The pair danced their way to USDF Champions in the Musical aspect of dressage as well.

As Charlotte and Firecracker entered into their first year of FEI (Federation Equestre International) competition, the pair was definitely making a name for themselves as they were listed in the Top 10 in the Nation. The pair had a following of pony clubbers and equine 4-Hers that would come and cheer them on at competitions. Bettye proudly wore a sweatshirt to competitions bearing the name and a likeness of Firecracker on the front. Firecracker competed in his first ever CDI in 2001, competing at the Grand Prix, the highest level of dressage. A CDI, Concours de Dressage International, which means international caliber dressage competition. Firecracker had to apply for a Passport and have an extensive veterinarian inspection to prove he was indeed our Firecracker.

One of the many CDI's that Charlotte and Firecracker competed in 2001 was the Dressage at Devon, in Devon, Pennsylvania. This was a very prestigious show, in one of the oldest competition grounds in the county. Upon arriving at the show grounds,

Firecracker went through his veterinarian check and prepared to go to the "jog" with Charlotte. The "jog" is watched by the head judge and the show veterinarian to check for any unsoundness of the horse that would prevent him from competition. During this "Jog", there was also a panel

experts that were judging the "Best Turned out Horse and Rider". Although Charlotte and Firecracker had planned on looking their very best, it being their first time to "Devon", they felt they

didn't have a chance in winning. So they completed the "Jog" and were given the OK to compete. Firecracker and Charlotte made the "cut" from the Grand Prix to the **Grand Prix Freestyle** for Saturday evening. After his Freestyle, Charlotte and Fire were awarded "Best Turned out Horse and Rider". The judging panel stated that there was something magical about the pair as they communicated to each other. Charlotte was overheard saying, "Yes, there is definitely magic here".

In 2003 Bettye Ferguson was diagnosed with Leukemia and two weeks later was

taken from us. Angel number two was now on Fire's shoulders. After working out a plan with Bettye's family, Charlotte became Firecracker's new owner. In 2003, at the end of the show season, Charlotte retired Firecracker from competition. For the next several years, Charlotte and Firecracker continued as a pair and were often seen riding in demonstrations showing the beauty and grace of dressage.

In the fall of 2009, Charlotte made a very tough decision for Firecracker and Firecracker's barn family. She had decided to offer Firecracker to Victory Gallop Therapeutic Center, in Bath Ohio. They felt much honored to be asked and of course agreed to take Firecracker. Keeping in mind that Bettye Ferguson was a foster parent of many Mentally Challenged children, Charlotte felt that this was a fitting place for her friend "Fire" to start a new career. She also knew that his Two Angels would approve of this decision and was sure Ann and Bettye were smiling down on them. Firecracker continued his life as a therapy horse for several years and touched the hearts and souls of many children. Firecracker died at Victory Gallop, September 11, 2011, from complications of colic. This was a horse that touched so many people's lives and made a difference in how people looked at the sport of dressage. He will be missed but not forgotten, he is in my heart forever.
