

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My 2012 Florida Internship Experience by Anna Ruple

recently had the amazing opportunity to go with my coach, Kate Poulin, to Michael and Sharon Poulin's School of Dressage at the Dressage Center Inc. in De Leon Springs, Florida, for a threemonth internship. Oberon, my 5year-old Arabian gelding, went with me. It was a working internship, so along with receiving lessons six days a week, I was working six days a week and living on the property with two other girls.

As all "horse people" know, horses are a 24/7 job. I knew upfront that the internship was going to test all of my abilities, from the physical demands of

everyday barn chores to living away from my family for the first time. I looked at it as a term in college away from home. I literally jumped off my safe island of living and riding at home in Ohio into a lake of remarkable trainers with a 50-stall barn filled with horses of various ages and training levels. All my previous barn management skills were tested, but I

what each horse was drinking each day). Horses would then be groomed and tacked for their various training sessions with one of the Poulins. Mid-day feedings were at 12:30 p.m. Lunchtime for us two-legged individuals varied from day to day, but intern lessons were always at 3:00 p.m. Late afternoon chores were conducted opposite of the morning and began with charting water and medicating, followed by having and feeding, concluding with an additional stall check. Many days we were finishing late-afternoon chores around 7:45 p.m. Night checks were done after our own dinners, showers, etc.

There were normally three to four

students working each day to keep the barn running smoothly like a well-oiled machine. Even with working long barn hours everyday, my fellow working students and I found many ways to keep the days entertaining, from random stories of our very different childhoods to seeing who could clean the most stalls in a day. Evenings in the house were just

was blessed with amazing fellow working students to help me along, teach me and keep me sane. And of course, I had Oberon.

At the Poulin's, morning chores began at 6:30 a.m. Feeding, administering medications, and cleaning stalls were followed by turnouts and water charting (yes, we kept a written record of

as entertaining – we would have something cooking, a high school film project playing on the TV, or six of us discussing different topics.

My personal goal in going to Florida with Oberon was to work on the basics of the training scale: rhythm, suppleness and contact. I had been working Oberon daily at home with a lesson once a week from Kate at Fair Weather Farm in Chagrin Falls, Ohio.

However, neither Oberon nor I was physically ready for an hour lesson six days a week. We started out slowly building muscles neither of us knew we had. I had to work to control my body and leg position, which in turn helped me to train Oberon. Oberon was patient with me while I was trained by Mr. Poulin, Mrs. Poulin or Kate though at times, all three would be reminding me to fix things! Those truly were some of my favorite lessons.

One of my favorite exercises was on the diagonal at the canter, doing a transition to trot then picking up the opposite lead. This goal of this exercise was to keep Oberon collected and connected through the transition to the trot, and then show a balanced trot for a few strides into a smooth upward canter transition. I would do them across the short diagonals and long diagonals until Mr. or Mrs. Poulin would call, "I

know you are having fun with that, but you need to work on your leg yield or trot extensions."

One major improvement I experienced was that once I got the feel of good contact, suppleness and impulsion, I could do more with Oberon laterally. We schooled leg yields on the rail, leg yields across the arena, and shoulder-in on the rail. All three of these exercises made Oberon more supple in his back as he stretched into the contact, something his little Arabian mind and neck does not like to do.

I learned so much theory of dressage from hearing the Poulin's teach other students, as well as watching them train horses. I hope the theory will come to me when I need it. After our three months of continuous training, Oberon and I went to a horse show as a test to see if we had improved. We performed Training Level Test Three and First Level Test One. Oberon was completely happy at the show. From the moment he got off the trailer, he looked around as if to say, "Yeah, I got this Anna, you don't have to worry about a thing." Oberon was my close partner, trusting me, which is yet another achievement in our dressage journey.

During my time at the Poulin's, I also had the opportunity to ride a few other horses, including a Grand Prix horse. It was a wonderful experience and helped me to feel movements I have not yet learned on my own horse, but hope to teach him one day. Warming horses up for the Poulin's was fantastic because I could simply work on my position and not worry about training the horse. I will not say every second working in the barn was easy or that every lesson was perfect, but it was an experience that helped me find out if riding horses at that level is what I want to do. I lived and breathed horses day and night for three months straight – and I think I passed the test. Dressage is not a discipline to go into halfheartedly – it's all or nothing. This experience could not have happened if it wasn't for my parents and family letting me live my dream of riding instead of going right off to college. I must also thank my coach Kate for her patience while instructing me in all things dressage (the whole way to Florida!), as well as for her continuous encouragement that I apply myself in my riding. I am grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Poulin for inviting me to train and work as one of their team and diligently encouraging me everyday, as well as everyone else at Dressage Center Inc., they are all very much loved and missed by me.

Anna Ruple was encouraged by her trainer, Kate Poulin, to write an article for NODA as a part of Anna's internship experience. Anna, a NODA member for five years was home schooled grades K-12 and has taken classes at the Ohio Extension Office in Business Management for Equines. She plans to attend Lakeland College this fall.

Anna and Oberon have been together a little over two years. Oberon was a reining prospect/Arabian Sport Horse in Arizona when Anna's mom stumbled upon him while visiting a friend at the Scottsdale Arabian horse show. Anna went out and tried him in all his western gear and fell in love with him. Anna started in training with Kate Poulin the summer of 2010 and continues to train with Kate in Ohio. Anna is continuing her dressage training with Oberon, and hopes to someday make it to Grand Prix. She also dreams of going to the Olympics. Her short-term goal is to compete at the 2012 Region 2 Dressage Championships at Training Level. She and Oberon already have their qualifying scores.

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Interview with an Equine Professional An occasional column Featuring Massage with Harry T. (Speedy) Graham, Speed's Equine Sports Service, Inc.

hy massage? What are the benefits?
 Massage increases blood flow and circulation throughout the entire body,
 helps to increase range of motion, relieves tight muscles and spasms, and helps the body parts move as one unit.

What should a client know before you arrive?

The treatment takes approximately two hours and someone must be available to hold the horse. The horse should be clean and dry and in a clean stall.

How can a client be helpful during massage?

Provide a brief history of yourself and the horse, as well as your perspective on any issues, abnormalities or uncharacteristic personality changes.

When do you recommend massage?

In addition to a maintenance schedule, massage is suggested when maneuvers or performances that are typically effortless become difficult or there is resistance. It can be helpful when stiffness or a lack of fluid movement becomes apparent, or when back soreness, bucking or resistance at the poll or on one rein occur.

What are you looking for when you massage?

Spasms or tightness, but also heat or abnormal cold in the body. I also look for the horse to give me feedback and input when there is pain. Their expressions will change, such as by moving away from me or sometimes biting or kicking at me, stomping or pawing the ground. I also watch for more subtle responses, like a big sigh, exhale, or licking or chewing when spasms or tightness have been released.

When do you ask a client to have a veterinarian look at the horse? Do you have a vet approve massage before you will work on a horse?

There are various reasons for veterinary consultation:

- If there has been trauma, such as an accident or fall.
- When a mare is pregnant.

- If prior massage treatments are ineffective and a problem persists.
- If there is heat or swelling.

I will often consult with the client's vet prior to treatment and follow up with the vet after treatment. It is not uncommon for me to decline to work on a horse if I feel the horse needs to be seen by a vet.

Talk about a successful progression over time with a client's horse.

I had a client who recently purchased a 4-year-old dressage prospect. The mare had a full set of x-rays done and passed the vet check without showing any lameness. However, early in warm-up, the rider felt there was a lack of movement in the right hind leg that seemed to be coming from the hip area. The client was concerned that a problem could hinder her career, especially with the physical demands of upper -level dressage movements.

Her vet, farrier and I consulted and agreed on a plan to help her and her rider reach their goals. We agreed that it most likely stemmed from a soft tissue injury when she was younger. Specifically, we agreed that I would do therapy once a month for six months and the vet would provide regular exams. Her rider would continue to ride and do exercises to strengthen and help the range of motion in the right hind leg. It became apparent very early in her therapy that breaking up old adhesions in the injured area was painful but necessary to restore the natural fluid movement.

After six months of everyone doing their part, the mare now has equal movement in both hind limbs and is continuing to move up the ladder in the levels of dressage.

From what you have learned from massaging horses over the years, what advice do you have for horse owners?

Don't wait until you have a big problem before you

seek treatment. Regular maintenance will keep your horse healthier, happier and can help prevent problems. Even if they are not immediately apparent, falls or accidents will eventually cause problems. They will rear their ugly heads if left untreated.

Often, problems will result from what we did not see happen. Horses are like children – they fall down and get back up and continue to play but don't tell "mom" unless it really hurts or they are bleeding. Always remember – if you own horses and haven't had any problems, you either haven't owned them long enough or have just been very lucky! We all want to have problems fixed immediately with ourselves and our horses, but even with treatment the body often needs time to heal.

How long have you been massaging horses? I am now starting my 21st year.

How did you get into equine massage?

I heard about a school that taught horse massage and thought about how much better I felt after a

massage. So it only made sense to me that a horse would feel better also. Both humans and horses are said to be comprised of approximately 65% soft tissue and have most of the same muscle make up. I knew I had to find out more about this school, and I had to enroll. I felt I could do this and help the horses.

Where have you received training?

I attended *Equissage* now in Round Hill, Virginia. When I attended in 1992, it was located in Southern Pines, North Carolina. I have been very fortunate to have had the opportunity to attend many clinics and seminars, and have met some excellent practitioners who took the time to share their knowledge and expertise. My mentor, Jack McGoogan, lives in California and is originally from Australia.

edge software that gives competitors virtually instant results after tests were completed, made possible because the judges have computers in their judge's boxes that scores go into as a horse and rider pair completes a test. This means scores are instantly tabulated for each ride, rather than waiting for a paper copy to be tabulated by a person. The July Waterloo show was well attended, and included many competitors from the Northeast Ohio area. The technical delegate was Lisa Gorretta (R).  35 entries for Stoney Ridge. Chris cancelled one of the judges. There are only 4 volunteers for show and there were questions as to whether the ring would be in or out. Riders calling Stoney Ridge directly may have been given misleading information on the status of the show.

Volunteering: Lisa Gorretta led a discussion on how to ramp up our members and get them to want to be involved. She cited examples from a northern Virginia show. Gail expressed her feelings of frustration in finding volunteers for every schooling show. She was able to coordinate 116 volunteers last year. It was suggested that we discuss with professionals ways to encourage their students to volunteer and participate in our educational programs.

New Business: A onetime donation of \$500 was received to establish the "Gretchen Singleton Fund." This fund will anonymously sponsor a class at the recognized shows each year. It was requested that the board pick the class. The board decided to have the Fund sponsor the qualifying test at lst level. They also decided to award a special ribbon (at NODA's cost) to the high point score from all divisions.
