ear NODA Members, I am going to start this letter out by saying how excited I was to get a response to my letter in last month's NODA News, where I asked for input from NODA members. The letter was posted on facebook by our webmaster and that's where it was read by one of NODA's professionals. The response was informative and contained good suggestions for NODA. Information of this sort really will help us make decisions that line up with what members want to see. I hope that more members will feel free to write and let us know what they want NODA to be for them. I spent the weekend of May 18th through 20th listening to Charles de Kunffy give riders and auditors words of wisdom. He never ceases to amaze me. The rider and horse levels were varied but the lesson to all remained consistent: "The theory of riding has to be in your head before it can be in your body." A rider must understand the movement to be able to effectively ride **in** the horse, in the

horizontal flow of the horse. His lecture Friday evening stressed the fact that the horizontal movement of the horse is in opposition to the vertical rider "on the horse". The rider must be in the movement of the horse, in the horizontal flow of the horse.

Charles also talked about the triangular conversation among the rider, horse, and coach. It was a new way for me to look at the information that flows to and from all three participants in a lesson. When I stopped to think about it, I realized there were many times when my horse was discussing with my coach a particularly hard time I might be experiencing learning or perfecting a movement. It's good to know that when I don't remember the language, my coach does and can pass information from my horse back to me.

The three days Charles was here this past weekend was not a NODA event, but it is an example of a local barn bringing in an out of town "name," and it was advertised on the NODA calendar, with auditors welcome. A clinic of this sort is primarily focused on teaching the rider, not teaching to the auditors. However, that being said, many, such as Charles, Christoph Hess, and others who give clinics in our area are delivering the same consistent message, which is based on the same Classical background. Listening to the lessons you can get more of the theory in your head so it can then be applied to your body when riding your horse. The more I learn and see, the more it is so clear to me that this is a lifelong journey for

No One Has Won A Gold Medal In Equestrian Sports Without Their Horse By George Williams

s we gear up for a summer of shows, I have a few thoughts about competing:

The one thing I have learned from years of showing is that it really is all about the journey. Our successes depend upon our training, preparation and a lot of luck. Most importantly though we have to remember the obvious, we can't do our sport without horses. Our horses are our partners and we want our time together to be a mutually beneficial experience.

What seems to me to be a zillion years ago when I was young and people talked of a "real horseman;" they spoke with true

admiration. They made it sound like such a desirable quality that even at a young age I wanted to try to reach their ranks. Looking back on my early years, I have to say Pony Club was a good first step for the basic training. The beauty of it is being a "real horseman" has nothing to with whether one is an amateur or professional. It is a worthy dream open to all who love horses. In my opinion it should be the goal of all who ride horses.

Now that the summer competition season is approaching and there seems to be a little buzz in the air, it is a good time to reflect on why we do what we do. No matter what level one is showing - at schooling shows or USEF licensed and USDF recognized competitions - most of us look forward to seeing how we might have improved over the winter. Although to be brutally honest, we probably all also feel some trepidation about finding out how the others might have improved as well. There is no doubt that competitiveness is a main element of competition.

When I was in my late teens riding in Germany with Egon von Neindorff, it was pointed out to me that one of the dangers of competition is believing our own results and thinking either we're good enough or even worse, better than we are. We can not lose sight of the fact that our main goal should be to improve our riding skills. This includes our ability to communicate with our horses and bring the most out of them in a manner that is harmonious and compatible with their temperament and ability. It also should reflect our desire to improve our own performance and create the feeling of being one with the horse. In other words the qualities needed to be a "real horseman."

The pluses of competing, especially when handled with the right attitude, far out weigh the negatives. Competitions do serve as an independent check of the quality and progress of our training. They provide us with incentives by allowing us to have measurable goals, such as obtaining a certain score or qualifying for GMO, Regional or National Championships. Perhaps earning "rider recognition" awards or even a year end award from a GMO, Breed association, USDF and/or USEF. However, keep in mind that in order to approach competing in a manner which is rewarding, it is important to set realistic goals.

A tremendous sense of accomplishment can come from the smallest of improvements in a mark, percentage or comments. Whatever your goal is; if it motivates you to be a better horseman and gives you joy, then it is a worthy goal and for that you should receive a score of "10."

As Competitors we also need to remember to be grateful to those who make the show happen,

Dressage Equitation Classes for Adult Amateurs and Youth An open letter from NODA's Professional Liaison, Mary Dana Prescott

Attention Adult Amateur and Junior Riders - \$10 Voucher Available for riding in and winning Dressage Equitation classes!

It behooves all Adult Amateur and Junior riders who are NODA members to enter the Dressage Equitation classes in both recognized and schooling shows when they are offered. This will help you "fine-tune" your riding skills, including your seat, position, and correct use of aids for different movements, and develop a feel of your horse and what is happening under you. All these things will immensely help your horse execute movements and gaits with much more quality, while you are maintaining a correct position and regularity of the gaits. Only then will the horse be clear in his understanding of your directions to him and be able to achieve better and more accurate quality in his test. This should inevitably bring your scores up, too. Talk to your instructors and trainers to get help with this.

The big news is that NODA is offering \$10 vouchers for winners of Dressage Equitation classes which can be applied towards entries for another show.

USEF/USDF Dressage Seat Medal Program for Youth

The purpose of the Dressage Seat Medal ("DSM") Program is to promote and reward correct seat, position and use of aids in dressage for Junior riders.

USDF will administrate the qualifying system and the Semi-Finals of USEF/USDF DSM program. It is our intent to grow participation nation-wide, both in the number of competitions offering the classes and in the number of riders competing in these classes; while at the same time, creating an effective and efficient method of qualifying for the USDF DSM Semi -Finals.

In an effort to do so, USDF is making it simple to ride and qualify for both the competitor and competition management. USDF will record results of all dressage seat equitation classes held at all USEF licensed/USDF recognized Dressage Competitions, but not all classes are eligible to be counted for qualifying purposes. Any dressage seat equitation class held at a USEF licensed/ USDF recognized Dressage Competition during the qualifying period may be used for qualifying for that year's USDF DSM Semi-Finals, with the exception of classes restricted by criteria other

than normal dressage rider categories of open, junior, or junior/young rider. Management will not have to collect any qualifying fees; only submit the results of each class in the same manner as the rest of the results.

What do you need to compete in a Dressage Seat Equitation Class?

The minimum requirements for rider/owner and horse are as follows:

- Rider must be a USDF Group or Participating Member at the time of the qualifying ride.
- Owner must meet minimum competition eligibility requirements.
- The horse must have either a USDF Horse Identification Number (HID) or a USDF Lifetime Horse Registration (LHR) at the time of the qualifying ride and at the time of the USDF DSM Semi-Finals.
- Borrowed horses are permitted.
- If a rider competes in the USDF DSM Semi-Final competition, a Participating Membership will be required: no USDF memberships for owner or

horse beyond minimum competition requirements.

- Refer to the USEF Rule Book for all rules regarding USEF Licensed competitions.
- Refer to USEF DR133 for complete specifications of the USDF/USEF DSM program.

There are two age divisions in the USDF DSM Semi-Finals: 13 & under and 14-18. A rider is eligible for the 13 and under Semi-Final class until the end of the calendar year in which he/she reaches the age of 13. A rider is eligible for the 14 through 18 Semi-Final class from the beginning of the calendar year in which he/she reaches 14 until the end of the calendar year in which he/she reaches the age of 18 (DR 133.2 (f)).

How do I qualify for the USDF Dressage Seat Medal Semi-Finals?

The Equine Mouth by Dr. Sandra Gebhart, DVM and Dr. Nicole Naso, DVM

he Veterinarians of Willow Creek Veterinary Service created this article to help horse owners understand the anatomy and physiology of the equine mouth. By understanding the importance of the horses' mouth, we can improve our care of their dentition creating a more comfortable horse that is more feed efficient and eliminate behavioral and performance problems associated with dental abnormalities.

Normal adult horses have 36-44 teeth, which replace the 24 baby teeth. Adults have 12 incisors; 6 upper and 6 lower, and 24 pre-molars and molars; 12 upper and 12 lower which are often referred to as the cheek A great question we hear a lot in our practice is "why teeth. Male horses have upper and lower canine teeth that erupt between the incisors and cheek teeth. Mares are less likely to have canine teeth, but occasionally have small, less developed ones. Some horses will have additional premolars that erupt just in front of the first large cheek tooth anywhere between 6 and 18 months of age, known as wolf teeth. Wolf teeth are adult teeth that serve no useful purpose. While the cheek teeth are very large and have deep roots making them very stable, wolf teeth are significantly smaller and have very short roots. If present, wolf teeth are located where the bit rests, and they can be a source of discomfort as they come into contact with the bit. Horses can have up to 4 wolf teeth, but it is most common to find 2 uppers if any at all. It is recommended that wolf teeth be removed prior to starting a young horse in training to eliminate oral discomfort as a cause of behavioral issues when bitted.

The horse's mouth is ever changing; the deciduous (baby) teeth erupt and are lost within the first 5 years of life and are replaced by the permanent teeth. The shape and alignment of the horses' teeth change over time as the horse ages. This gradual shift is different in every horse and is impacted by the angle of eruption, the type of feed ingested, the environment, including time spent on pasture, and the forces of mastication (chewing). Horses have continuously erupting teeth that that are slowly worn down over time. As a horse becomes geriatric, tooth loss is

common because the entire length of the tooth has erupted and the root is exposed and then lost. Incisors are used for cutting or shearing of forage (picking up bites of hay, grasping and cutting grass). Incisors should line up symmetrically and level. Pre molars and molars are used for grinding the feed before swallowing. The upper jaw (maxilla) is anatomically wider than the lower jaw (mandible). This difference in alignment leads to the formation of sharp enamel points that do not get worn down on the outside of the upper teeth and inside of the lower teeth.

does my horse need dental floating so often, when

wild horses have no dental care?" To answer that question it is necessary to compare the environment and activities of the wild and domestic horse. Wild horses spend up to 18 hours a day grazing and grinding rough forages. This causes a lot more even and consistent wear on their teeth, unlike most domestic horses that are stabled and fed a few times a day with much of that being grain or cut and dried forage. The other major factor is natural selection. When horses in the wild reproduce, it is

generally the strongest and healthiest individuals that do so. Domestic horses are bred for other gualities such as temperament, beauty, and athletic potential. These qualities make for great pets and athletes, but

often leave them needing additional support from their owners to keep them healthy. This is why routine dental exams and floating are so important in maintaining your horse's overall health.

Oral exams should be an essential part of an annual physical examination by a veterinarian. Every dental

exam provides the opportunity to perform routine preventative dental maintenance. Mature horses should get a thorough dental exam at least once a year, and horses 2 –5 years old should be examined twice yearly. During the exam; sedation and a full mouth speculum is often required to visualize the entire oral cavity. The mouth is evaluated for symmetry and function and all areas are assessed for abnormalities, including; ulcers, masses, foreign bodies, periodontal disease, swellings, scarring, and tooth number and morphology.

It is important to catch dental problems early. If a horse starts behaving abnormally, dental problems should be considered as a potential cause. Waiting too long may increase the difficulty of remedying certain conditions or may even make remedy impossible. Look for the following indicators of dental problems from the American Association of Equine Practitioners (AAEP) to know when to seek veterinary attention for your horse:

1. Loss of feed from mouth while eating, difficulty with chewing, or excessive salivation.

2. Loss of body condition.

3. Large or undigested feed particles (long stems or whole grain) in manure.

4. Head tilting or tossing, bit chewing, tongue lolling, fighting the bit, or resisting bridling.

5. Poor performance, such as lugging on the bridle, failing to turn or stop, even bucking.

6. Foul odor from mouth or nostrils, or traces of blood from the mouth.

7. Nasal discharge or swelling of the face, jaw or mouth tissues.

The anatomy of the equine mouth coupled with the natural physiology provides the basis on which our dental exam is based. Understanding the dentition and taking preventative measures can elevate performance, lengthen the horse's lifespan, provide comfort and improve overall quality of life. We encourage you to seek expert veterinary care when it comes to your horse's dental health. Modern equine dentistry is creating a healthier population of horses that are living longer than ever before.

Schooling Show Prize List **Rule 8 Clarification**

Currently, page 7, rule 8, and Championship Rule page 13, rule 8, say riders must be in different divisions and horse must be in consecutive levels which makes it sound like the horse cannot be ridden in the SAME level.

The Board clarified rule 8 as follows: Rule 8 page 7, and Rule 8 page 13 are amended to say: Horses may compete with multiple riders in the same or consecutive levels only. (Riders must enter different classes or be in different divisions.)

As an example: "Horse can show and qualify with rider A in Intro Novice Junior AND with rider B in Intro Open Amateur."
