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

I want to talk this month
not about the weather, but about
the direction of our GMO. I have
been thinking a lot about our
mission of providing education to
dressage riders.

There has been great and growing support for our schooling show series, yet rather lackluster support for other NODA sponsored educational events. The reasons explaining the lack of interest are not completely clear, but I believe there are probably multiple issues involved. First, dressage riders in our area have a lot available to them today. Area farms and local professionals host clinics, veterinarians hold seminars and lecture series, and there are myriad on-line education opportunities that allow us to learn in the comfort of our own homes. NODA must begin to rethink our approach to providing education to our members.

NODA believes the education of our riders is so important that we want to look for new ways to provide that education. We have already done this a couple of times by supporting

some lectures/demos when clinicians were in the area. These events were well attended and seemed to be appreciated. NODA is currently looking into once more joining efforts with Topline Stables by sponsoring a lecture/demo in August with Jan Ebeling. Saying this, I would like to throw out a proposal to all of you. If you or your barn plans to host a clinic or event that might be of interest to our members, consider approaching NODA for sponsorship. It makes more sense to join rather than compete with local professionals and farms.

If you are having an event and/or bringing in a clinician that may be of interest to our members, let us pool our efforts and join together.

A current example of joining together and partnering to bring events to the area is NODA's alliance with LEC to bring the 2012 USDF/ Nutrena Adult Clinic for Region 2 to the Lake Erie College Equestrian Center. The last time Ohio had the privilege of hosting the Adult Clinic was when Walter Zettl was here. We are now, these many years later, bringing in another of dressage's finest, Lilo Fore. This Clinic, being held June 30th and July 1<sup>st</sup>, is not free to riders or auditors, but it is very well priced. Riding with someone like Lilo for two days for \$250.00 is an opportunity that doesn't happen often.


making life easier when showing. Read and learn!!! Thanks Mary Lou.

## Schooling Show Prize List Rule 8 Clarification

Currently, page 7, rule 8, and Championship Rule page 13, rule 8, say riders must be in different divisions and horse must be in consecutive levels which makes it sound like the horse cannot be ridden in the SAME level.

The Board clarified rule 8 as follows:
Rule 8 page 7, and Rule 8 page 13 are
amended to say: Horses may compete with
multiple riders in the same or consecutive
levels only. (Riders must enter different
classes or be in different divisions.)

As an example: "Horse can show and qualify with rider A in Intro Novice Junior AND with rider B in Intro Open Amateur."



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

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# Lecture Overview: Dr. William Jackson, DVM Treatments For and the Rehabilitation Of the Injured Horse by Mosie Welch

here is a benefit to working as a co-editor on the NODA Newsletter; one really knows what's out there of interest to equestrians. I always think I'll partake of these many opportunities, but the dates pass by and I've missed them all. On February 20, 2012 I decided to make the drive to Equine Specialty Hospital for the lecture on "Treatments For and the Rehabilitation of the Injured Horse" presented by Dr. William Jackson, DVM, MBA, SACVS. In the audience were about 40 women, equestrians of all disciplines. Sitting near me were a mother and adult daughter, with three Morgans between them, who had driven an hour and a quarter from Lorraine County for the program. A Stow woman with a Tennessee Walking Horse she mainly trail rides in the Mill Creek Reservation. And a woman who had only found out about the lecture on that very day when she unexpectedly brought her horse in to Equine Specialty Hospital for treatment. Dr. Jackson began his presentation by telling us that it doesn't matter what discipline or what level of work a horse is involved in; from pleasure riding to jumpers; just like humans, horses get injured. No matter what discipline, the treatment and rehabilitation remains the same; with the goal that the horse will recover and return to its work. In the course of the two-hour presentation Dr. Jackson gave us an overview of bone and soft tissue injuries, a model of wound healing, and an overview of available treatments, as well as the timeframe and basic process for rehabilitation. I got a lot out of the presentation so I wanted to share a little of what I learned from the talk.

Dr. Jackson reviewed a very simple model of wound healing which applies to any injury: the inflammatory phase, the proliferative phase, and the remodeling phase. It is the rate of healing and the capacity to heal that differs from structure to structure. The wound-healing model is similar for all wounds, internal or external, but the time frame may vary based on the structure and location. For the purpose of the lecture Dr. Jackson's description was very basic and broke down the lengthy process into three main steps, when actually there are many steps in the

process which overlap in the course of healing.

Dr. Jackson pointed out that bone is the only tissue in the body that has the capacity to heal 100%, with little or no scar tissue, returning the bone to its original strength in three to four months. This is because normal bone tissue is constantly being replaced, which aids in the healing process. Soft tissue injuries, on the other hand, take two years to heal and only regain 80% strength at best. For instance, an injury to a ligament, the structure that connects bone to bone, is a strain or tearing of fibers, which Dr. Jackson likened to spaghetti held in the hand. The strain or sprain results in something like removing some of the spaghetti and leaving a void. The danger is that the tissues that fill the void are not in a "spaghetti-like alignment," but are haphazard and less elastic than the rest of the ligament, and can cause a future pull or tear to occur above or below the original injured site. In a tendon, which connects muscle to bone, Dr. Jackson told us the fibers that are damaged act more like guitar strings; when they break, they coil back leaving spaces that must be filled. He then discussed the healing process.

The inflammatory phase is the first period of the healing process and occurs in the first two to five days following the injury. The body's immediate reaction is to control the bleeding by vasoconstriction, or a clamping of the muscular artery walls and the infusion of clotting platelets, followed by vasodilation, which is the edema evident by the swelling in the injured area. During this phase there is the beginning of the process called phagocytosis, which is the body's ongoing and continual removal of damaged tissues, and which lasts through all phases of healing. Next comes the proliferative phase which lasts from about two days to three weeks and includes granulation, or the "scaffolding" of new and very fragile tissue with little nerve supply and a large blood supply that will support healing. During this phase wound edges pull together to reduce the defect and there is a process of building new tissue called epithelialization, which is the active division and

migration of epidermal cells from the wound margin across the open wound to promote and grow new tissue. Dr. Jackson pointed out that horses have a very high capacity to heal above the hock, whereas below the hock healing can lead to an excess of granulation, often called proud flesh. Open wounds at hock level and below must be monitored and trimmed to prevent this over accumulation. The third joint inflammation and moderate to severe arthritis in phase of this very simple wound-healing model is the remodeling phase, defined as three weeks to two years; in other words Dr. Jackson reminded us, "There is no quick fix." All soft tissue injuries need a long, long time for optimal healing. The focus during the remodeling phase is the management of scar tissue so that it heals in an organized pattern consistent with the tissue surrounding it to aid in regaining and maintaining the highest level of strength possible in the injured area (remember that's 80% in tendons or ligaments) in order to minimize the possibility of reinjury.

At this point Dr. Jackson switched gears to discuss an overview of therapies available to equestrians for the rehabilitation of their horses. Dr. Jackson said sometimes a "new procedure" will sweep through a barn and everyone jumps on that bandwagon because there is anecdotal evidence of success, but really there may be very little science behind the treatment. Dr. Jackson stated that Equine Specialty Hospital bases its protocols on scientific evidence and research with a goal to provide clients the best possible outcomes using scientifically based therapies.

On the subject of joint injections Dr. Jackson discussed treatments aimed at arthritis, which is a progressive, degenerative disease of the joints (DJD). He discussed therapies targeted at slowing the process and maintaining comfort in work, as there is no cure. He also pointed out that these therapies may be indicated in some joint injuries or post surgery. One injectable therapy is Hylartin or HA which is a component of healthy joints. HA is generally harvested from cows or sharks and is a very viscous substance the consistency of an egg white. It is injected into a moderate to high action joint such as an upper hock, stifle, or cervical spine articulations. It aids in maintaining existing cartilage as well providing

lubrication and a mild anti-inflammatory action. It is best used in mild to moderate arthritis or in cases of joint trauma caused by injury or surgical interventions. HA does not cause damage the joint. He reviewed the uses and side effects of corticosteroids such as Depro-Medrol and Triamcinolone Acetonide used to treat non-septic low to moderate motion joints. Steroids are rarely used in cases of trauma or post surgery. The preference at this time is for the longer acting Depo-Medrol. The benefits of injecting a corticosteroid must outweigh the risks, as over time, injecting corticosteroids into a joint will accelerate damage to the cartilage because steroids are a crystalline substance that will always leave trace crystals in a joint. The last joint therapy Dr Jackson discussed was Interleukin-I Receptor Antagonist Protein (IRAP) which is used in moderate to severe arthritis for non septic joint inflammation, and like corticosteroids is best suited for low to moderate motion joints. It is rarely used after an injury or post surgery. IRAP works by slowing the degenerative process by introducing anti inflammatory leukins or proteins into the joint. The veterinarian draws the horse's blood under sterile preparation. The blood must be maintained in a temperature-controlled incubation within two minutes of the blood draw to maintain the integrity of the sample. Failure to get the sample to incubation reduces the effectiveness of final product. Once processed the IRAP must remain frozen until just before injection into the joint.

From here Dr. Jackson went on to discuss Platelet Rich Plasma or PRP, which is most commonly used for core lesion injuries of tendons or ligaments, in bursitis, or in cases of severe tendonitis. It is also useful for select joint issues and is commonly used intra-operatively between tissue layers or with implants to speed healing during the recovery period. There is a strong body of scientific research showing the effectiveness in humans. In the body's own healing process, injured tissues fill with a serum of platelets; so a core lesion or tear in a tendon or ligament will fill with its own platelet rich serum. But PRP is the collection of an even higher concentration of the healing platelets than the body can make on its own, which are then injected into the injury to speed

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the horse's own healing process. The platelets are collected from the patient in a sterile preparation blood draw after which the blood sample is put into a centrifuge to isolate the healing platelets. The resulting platelets are then injected directly into the lesion guided by ultrasound to ensure proper placement.

Dr. Jackson then touched briefly on Stem Cell Therapies which are not currently offered by Equine Specialty Hospital because the evidence for use of this therapy are anecdotal and variable with 0% scientific data in human or equine research that they work. Stem Cell Therapies are based on the theory that all tissues start from omnipotent or stem cells that develop to a point where a trigger directs the stem cells to specialize. The theory is if stem cells are injected into a damaged body part, they will regenerate that body part to its original form. The process of gathering and isolating the stem cells is complicated and requires exacting procedures within a specific time schedule requiring a sterile process from start to finish with very short turnaround time using the animal's own fat tissue. The procedure counts on isolating stem cells which, to date, is not always a reliable process.

Dr. Jackson also briefly touched on shockwave therapy which has a high level of anecdotal success, but very little science behind it. Equine Specialty does not offer shockwave therapy. If used it should be provided by a machine with a focusable beam and care must be taken in prescribing and applying shockwave therapy based on the location of the lesion.

The discussion concluded with perhaps the most important part of the lecture – a discussion of the rehabilitation process and non-invasive therapies to support joint and soft tissue injury healing over the long course of the remodeling phase of healing which can last up to two years. Because the goal is to minimize and manage the quality of the scar tissue and ensure that the injured area returns to the highest level of strength possible, care must be taken to introduce controlled exercise in increments. In the horse world, rehabilitation therapy is a new concept, but over the last five to ten years, rehabilitation and

preventative medicine is becoming more and more available for horses. If you consider human healing and rehabilitation following a joint, tendon, or ligament injury you know there is a component of physical therapy and strength training over time. Time and stall rest with controlled exercise have long been the standard for equine recovery and still remain the basis of the rehabilitation program. The six month time period during rehabilitation of an injury is a critical time. Even when following all the prescribed activity and recommended therapies and rehabilitation, the likelihood of re-injury is high during this period due to the weight, concussion, and the unevenness of the use of the horses musculature as the horse starts back into real work. In other words the horse's weight and asymmetry in movement are of concern when increasing the workload. The water treadmill and the hyperbaric chamber as part of the rehabilitation process are two non-invasive therapy options which are scientifically proven to aid in the best outcome possible for joint and soft tissue injuries when they are available.

The water treadmill, allows a horse to exercise and use the full range of motion of an affected area without the weight and concussion of out of water exercise. It can reduce the impact of weight during exercise by 40%. It is useful in recovery of soft tissue damage, joint injury, and post-surgical trauma, and in ensuring adequate bone remodeling. When horses exercise in a water treadmill, they must use themselves equally, forcing the weak side to work and preventing the strong side from taking over the work. Significant improvement of balance and stride, generally improved cardio vascular function, and the rapid building of correct musculature (top-line) are benefits of the water treadmill for horses with and without specific injury. Equine Specialty Hospital is building a structure off their back barn that will house a water treadmill for therapy and conditioning. Rehabilitation and conditioning programs will be offered along with their other therapies. Another new addition coming at a later date will be an arena off the opposite side of the back barn to compliment diagnosis, rehabilitation, and conditioning programs.

The other non-invasive therapy is the hyperbaric chamber, which has received a lot of press in the

horse world of late due to the accident causing the death of a person and horse and the severe injury of another person in February 2012 at KESMARC, a Rehabilitation and Conditioning Center in Ocala, Florida. This type of accident, while alarming, is a rarity and the incidence may be mitigated with pretreatment preparations which include removing the horse's shoes, padding the chamber, and using specific halters to limit the possibility of sparking within the chamber. The hyperbaric chamber delivers a pressured treatment of 100% oxygen, which is useful in conditioning and rehabilitation. The clinical uses of the hyperbaric chamber are numerous and the benefit of the oxygen saturation is to any area of the body where there is a void of oxygen. The hyperbaric chamber provides a saturation of oxygen in the red blood cells and plasma which aid in delivering increased oxygen to a lesion. The Equine Specialty Hospital is considering adding a hyperbaric chamber to its treatment modalities.

The evening lecture at Equine Specialty Hospital started at 7:00 pm and Dr. Jackson was still chatting individually with participants with specific questions when the Q&A period ended at 9:00 pm. The cost of attendance was \$10.00 and it was well worth it. Each participant left with lecture notes and a better understanding of the treatment and rehabilitation of injuries and an idea of what the Equine Specialty Hospital has to offer. Dr. Jackson's lecture was very educational and informative and his delivery was professional, humorous, and direct. It was an evening well spent and I recommend attending future lectures offered by Equine Specialty Hospital.

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
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### Jeni Gaffney and the Gaffneys Affair with Horses! By Elizabeth Bross

eni Gaffney, DVM, is a familiar name to many NODA members. She owns The Visiting Vet in Bath, OH and, along with her son Colin, is an active participant in many NODA events. Horses are a family affair for the Gaffneys. Husband Sean also rides and the horses are kept at their home. Sean and Jeni originally met as teenagers through Pony Club. They lost touch during their time in

college but saw each other again at hunt party 20 years ago. At that party, Jeni recalls, she reminded Sean that they had been in Pony Club and participated in the National Rally together. Sean's response was that he remembered being the Stable Manger for four "gorgeous girls" and could remember Jeni's commitment to her sport is clearly shown each of them, except for Jeni. To prove she was indeed on the team she showed Sean a photo. The rest, as Jeni puts it, "is history."

"I have always loved horses and wanted to become a veterinarian," says Jeni. "My parents hoped it was a passing phase but unfortunately, I still have the horse bug today. My first riding lessons were at a facility much like Rocky River. I became a barn rat and soon my uncle gave me a horse, a retired Standardbred racer named Duke. Duke would jump anything but would pace the last two strides into a fence." Jeni's second horse, "Buff," took her to her first three-day event and to Young Riders. He was purchased for \$400 and bucked Jeni off 21 times during their first year together. Jeni was just as persistent when it came to her chosen career path. She worked for the local veterinarian while in middle and high school, using her horse as transportation to and from the clinic. Later on, she attended Ohio State for her undergraduate education and veterinary school.

While in veterinary school she lived in the hospital and took all the late night phone calls, worked the lab and pharmacy, and helped with colics. After graduation, she worked for the Lorain County Veterinary Clinic and then the Westside Animal **Emergency Clinic for 23** years. Jeni then started Visiting Vet, an equine and small animal practice, because she wanted to keep working with horses. Five years ago, Visiting Vet relocated

from the basement of her home to an office building. Dr. Endia Peckham and Jeni are accompanied by a staff of four avid riders—Barb, Beth, Meaghan, and Riki.

through her dedication to continuing education not only for herself, but also for son Colin and other young riders who are eager to learn. The family owns a collection of horses, several of which are leased to Bath Pony Club members. She stresses the importance of having a seasoned schoolmaster to help children learn. Colin's current mount is "Judge Not" or "Aldie" as he is known in the barn. Aldie is a former Preliminary and Intermediate level eventer that is showing Colin the ropes of Beginner Novice and Novice level eventing. Jeni was fortunate herself to have a schoolmaster to introduce her to the FEI dressage levels. She leased "Marlie" for three years and dubs her the most influential horse of her riding career. Because of Marlie, Jeni has tried to find excellent schoolmasters for Colin. She says, "It is much easier to learn when the horse already knows the movements." Her advice for other dressage moms and adult amateurs is to obtain the horse with the highest level of training that you can afford. An older schoolmaster that is sympathetic to the novice

rider is so encouraging, and it is much easier to focus on development of the rider's seat when the horse is already trained. With children, especially boys, it is important to have a pony that they can ride bareback, gallop, jump and just have fun with.

Their most interesting acquisition is Sean's jack-of-all-trades eventer, foxhunter, show jumper, and dressage mount. "Not Mine" was purchased 14 years ago (BC—or before Colin) while Jeni was administering spring vaccines. He was a spur-of-the-moment decision, and since Jeni already had a horse she told Sean that she had bought the horse for him. Sean reacted by saying, "I don't need a horse, he is not mine!" Jeni rebutted, "I don't need another horse, so he is not mine, either!" And so "Not Mine" got his name and has since proved to be a wonderful all-round horse that has performed well at everything asked. A judge who saw his name noted they should rename him "All Mine."

Jeni and Colin use the schooling shows offered by NODA to prepare for their eventing and recognized show seasons. The NODA recognized show is Colin's favorite dressage show, and he loves to volunteer and earn NODA bucks there. He started showing at NODA shows when he was eight and always wants it on



Jeni continues to give back to her community and is currently the Co-Chairman of the first Dusty Boots Derby Benefit for the Valley Riding, Inc. Therapeutic and Urban Outreach Riding Programs.

For Jeni, what started out as typical horse crazy developed into a passion, and finally has become the thread that weaves the fabric of her life. Horses are her life's work, her love, the way she measures a good day...and sometimes the way she measures the most difficult times of her life. And for the Gaffney family, horses provide a framework within which they work, and play, and grow together in a Family Affair with their horses.

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### THE USEF/USDF MASTER VERIFICATION SEARCH Records You Need at Your Fingertips!

and some of you by now have ridden in a recognized show. You've had a new Coggins drawn, your USEF and USDF memberships were renewed by January, and you are all set for the rest of the year. For the other 99% of us, panic strikes as we try to get our first entry form to the post office by the closing date. You can't find your new The membership cards, you've lost the horse's registration papers, (or you need to get both papers and new cards from the horse's owner) and now you don't have time to get copies made before the post office closes. And the final straw--by the time you cram copies of every required document into an envelope, you end up paying extra for the postage.

In order to maintain your sanity (and to keep the show secretary happy) may I suggest that you make use of the USEF/USDF Master Verification Search If you have all of your memberships renewed in time, you can print a copy of all your documents on one page. This search engine can also be used even if you have only HID numbers for your horse and/or a USDF non-member identification number for yourself. (P.S., Hopefully you did take my advice in my previous article and you have applied for a free USDF HID for your horse. You'll need it to make the master verification search engine work.)

The master verification search engine can be found on both the USEF and USDF websites. On the USEF home page scroll down the choices along the left side of the page. Click on "Membership" and on the new menu pick the last choice "USEF Affiliates Verification." If you use the USDF web site, scroll to "Membership" on the grey banner. On the new menu under Person, click on the last choice "USDF/ USEF Master verification." One word of advice: have your numbers, your horse's numbers, and the rider's numbers (if different from the owner) in front of you when you start. You can try filling in just the name of your horse if it is unique, but there also might be twenty other horses with the same unique name. Differences in spelling the rider's name can also halt

pring seems to have come and gone already the process. For example, if the USEF has my first name as Mary Lou and USDF has it as Mary L., the search might not be successful. (Another problem is different spellings of last names-McCoy will not be considered the same as Mc Coy.) So it is actually easier to start with the numbers in front of you.

> verification search provides very clear On the Welcome page, hit "Print instructions. Verification", on the next page "Select Affiliate" and then "USDF." You are then told to enter the horse's numbers and hit "Search." When your horse's name comes up, you must still click on both the USEF and USDF choices in order to get a "Continue" button. The owner's numbers will then come automatically. Again, you must still click on both choices to continue. If given a choice between selecting a USDF participating membership **USDF** group membership, choose the participating membership. You will next have to type in the rider's numbers, even if they are the same as the owner's. Finally, you are given a link to print out the page. If you send this verification page in with your entry, you do NOT need to send copies of your cards or horse's recordings.


> The only additional documentation you must include with your entry is a copy of your negative Coggins. By the way, requirements for Coggins tests are not set by national and/or local riding organizations but by state governments. The USEF rulebook, however, does require that the name of the horse on the Coggins must match the name of the horse on all the other documentation sent with the entry to a dressage show. In other words, your horse's show name must be the name of the horse on the Coggins. If the results have not come back from a new test, write "new test pending" on your entry. You can send a copy later to the show secretary or bring it with you when you check in at the show office. If you want to be considered for a breed award offered at the show (such as ones offered for Trakehners or Hanoverians), you will also have to supply a copy of your horse's breed's registration papers.

The master verification search is an easy way to guarantee that you have all the necessary documents. It will save you time and money since you won't have to fill out affidavits at every show. If you use the master verification search and provide the correct documentation you definitely WILL make this show secretary happy: preventing her from thinking evil thoughts while she is scheduling the riders for the 7:30 am time slots!


