

We realize that the volatile weather in our area in February delayed auditors and demo riders from committing too early, and until about a week before the event we were uncertain whether we would have enough demo riders to provide the variety that was necessary. But we ended up with more people offering to be demo riders than we needed. The nine demo riders were great sports and we so appreciate them putting themselves out there so the rest of us could learn. We are very grateful to each and every one of them.

We also want to thank Dr. Pam Hess and Nicole Van Dyke of Lake Erie College for their invaluable assistance, and especially Bernie Moauro, our Education Committee Co-chair, for taking on the planning and execution of this event with a very short time line. I haven't gotten the results of the event surveys yet, but in talking to individuals, I believe that it was well received. The auditors learned a lot about the tests and how they will be judged, and we learned that these tests are not in any way easy. In my opinion, the expectation of each test is that a competitor who rides this test well at Training, First, or Second level will also be riding a respectable qualifying test at that level. I encourage you all to learn these tests, and to work on them with your trainers/instructors or on your own. Working on perfecting these new tests will make us better riders, I guarantee it. Remember that these will be offered as "test of choice" at NODA shows. Go for it! Be the first NODA member to receive a year-end award for this new test.

- Silent Auction set-up: Item organization, signage and setup at the venue


The people who have done these jobs in the past will help you learn and take over these positions.

# What Participants Instructors May Expect From the Training/First Level Instructor/Trainer Workshop—Lungeing: April 27 and 28, 2013

he USDF Introductory Level Instructor/Trainer Workshops are open to everyone and are ideal for developing riders and those interested in becoming active in the profession or seeking USDF Instructor/Trainer certification. Only eight Participant Instructor (PI) slots are available. All others attending the workshop will be auditing participants.

The focus of the USDF Instructor/Trainer Workshops is on developing the technical and practical skills needed to lunge, ride, train and teach dressage. More experienced professionals may wish to attend the introductory level in order to review their technique and confirm skills.

The Introductory Level Lungeing Workshop, taught by USDF faculty member Sarah Martin, will be held on April 27 and 28. Several hours of lecture presentation will be followed by hands-on equipment set-up and lungeing technique in the arena.

The USDF Lungeing Manual is the primary text and the overall program will cover safety, correct use and fit of various types of lungeing equipment, correct technique, as well as the relationship of lungeing to the Pyramid of Training and the development of the horse. This is a hands -on workshop for Pls. Pls are actively involved in the set-up and lungeing and each must bring a horse that is trained to lunge, is sound and fit, and must not have difficult training problems or bad vices, such as rearing, kicking or bucking.

On Day 1 of the lungeing workshop, PIs will fit and adjust lungeing equipment on three different horses, one of which will be lunged for 10 minutes. There will be sharing of participant horses to accomplish this. On Day 2, each PI will set up and lunge one horse. Each student must wear an ASTM-approved helmet when lungeing.

The PIs will be evaluated by the faculty instructor on their ability to identify strong and weak points of the horse and the student must be able to accept instruction. It is a necessity that the PI understands that their demonstrated technique and skills will be discussed by the faculty instructor and participating instructor group.

PIs fees will include a \$300 program fee and \$85 weekend stabling. Lunch will be provided for the PIs. **NODA** is offering one professional grant per session to a **NODA** member professional that meets the USEF definition of a professional. Information on how to apply for the NODA

grant can be found in the ad on this page. If you are interested in participating in the workshop, please contact the program organizers as soon as possible.

The information provided here is taken directly from the USDF Instructor Certification Education Program Guidelines. Next month, NODA News will provide information regarding the auditor experience and what an auditor can expect to gain from the workshop, as well as a biography on the USDF faculty instructor Sarah Martin. The Auditor Registration Form is available on page 5 of this issue.

The USDF Instructor/Trainer Workshop is being cosponsored by NODA and Lake Erie College and organized by NODA's Educational Committee. Three workshops will be presented in 2013 covering the Introductory Level. 

#### Learn Online with USDF's e-TRAK By Elizabeth Bross

re you taking advantage of all the perks that come hours. Both options conclude with a test of your with your USDF membership? e-TRAK (www.usdf.org/e-trak/) is the USDF's online learning center that all USDF (participating, group, education and business) members have full access to. e-TRAK offers hundreds of videos, book exerts and articles in PDF form and a Learning Center with quizzes that can count toward USDF University (http://www.usdf.org/ education/university/) credit. Not limited to lessons in dressage, e-TRAK covers a wide variety of topics. General health care, reproduction, grooming and facility management are among those included. The USDF takes the services even further by stating, if you have used both the search feature and looked through the categories and can't find the information you are looking for, you may contact the USDF for help.

e-TRAK stands for equine-based tools and resources to help you acquire knowledge, and that knowledge comes from a variety of reliable sources. A large portion comes from the USDF educational material that has been produced over the years. Other sources include, but are not limited to: AAEP, DiscoverHorses.com, Nutrena, Succeed, Adequan, America Horses Daily and SmartPak. The contents of e-TRAK continue to grow on a daily basis, so be sure to check the website regularly for updates.


The e-TRAK online learning center enables users to browse through topics or search for specific phrases. If you find yourself struggling with a specific movement, simply search the e-TRAK website to find videos and text to target that exercise. For example, searching "shoulder-in" yields approximately 20 results. Included are USDF Symposium videos with Henk Van Bergen and Kyra Kyrkland, clips from the On The Levels series and exerts from the USDF Training Manual.

Browsing the topics is another great way to explore what e -TRAK has to offer. Information is categorized under nine different topics in the browse option. This is a great way to begin using the e-TRAK website if you do not have an exact topic in mind.

Clicking e-TRAK's Learning Center tab offers members a powerful way to expand their knowledge. When using the Learning Center, you can choose to pursue "Quick Study" or "In-Depth Study" topics. The "Quick Study" topics are estimated to take approximately 15 minutes to complete while the "In-Depth Study" topics can take two or more

knowledge. USDF University Credit is given upon successful completion of the learning assessment at the end of each "In-Depth Study." There are 10 in-depth studies available and each is worth 0.25 USDF University credits. You could earn a total of 2.5 credits on your own time, without leaving your home and without paying an additional fee.

"Liking" e-TRAK on Facebook is a great way to get a daily bit of information. The USDF does an excellent job of posting riding and training tips that are accompanied by short videos or links to articles. The posts vary from day to day and include clarification of rule changes, quotes, shared blog entries, video clips from their archives, and examples from events like the Trainers' Conference.



Currently, approximately 370 people "like" e-TRAK. It seems to be a hidden gem considering the USDF's official Facebook page has over 13,000 "likes!" I hope NODA members will take advantage of this easy way to keep upto-date with e-TRAK. Taking a few minutes each day to review the new post will help incorporate out-of-thesaddle learning into your routine.

If you are looking to gain a better understanding of what the judges will be looking for this upcoming show season, need some ways to improve your own riding or want advice on how to better assist your students, e-TRAK may offer what you need. Best of all, since you've already paid your NODA membership fee, you won't have to get your credit card out to gain access!



## Barn Fire Prevention By Dr. Jeni Gaffney, DVM

arn fires are one of a horse owner's biggest nightmares. Thankfully, most barn fires are preventable. Fires need heat, fuel and oxygen. A barn with good ventilation provides oxygen, and fuel can be anything from wood, hay, bedding, alcohol and liniments. The heat source can be sunlight, friction, electrical energy, flame and bacterial/chemical reactions.

Use the rules below to evaluate your barn for sources of heat, fuel and oxygen.

Stable Rules for Fire Prevention Stringently enforce "No Smoking" rules!

#### Keep your barn clean!

A broom and a rake are excellent fire-prevention tools. Use the broom to regularly clean cobwebs, which provide pathways for the flames to travel. Keep all loose hay and straw raked up. Cover openings if you have hay drops from loft into the barn.

unattended. Radios, clippers, extension cords and water heating coils should be disconnected when not in use. Routinely, (every three months) clean the dust from electrical devices and outlets with a can of compressed air.

#### Look outside your barn for fire prevention.

Remove weeds, trees, old equipment, and wood piles and

debris from around the barn. This is fuel that can ignite and start a barn fire or can aid the spread of fire from one structure to another.

#### Consider your farm equipment

Tractors and other vehicles should be parked at least 50 feet away from the barn. Refueling should be done far away from the barn, as gasoline vapors can easily ignite. Be sure to clean off equipment after each use as dried grass or plant material on the tractor can ignite. Never leave a tractor running in the barn! All

engines produce an odorless gas called carbon monoxide, which displaces oxygen from red blood cells resulting in unconsciousness and death.

#### Keep the barn cool.

Hay or sawdust that is incompletely cured can have a chemical/bacterial reaction. This can generate heat, causing spontaneous combustion, mild irritation or a sooty odor, which may indicate spontaneous heating.

#### Check newly baled hay for at least 6 weeks.

You can insert a meat thermometer into the center of the bale. If the thermometer reads over 150 F, recheck every four hours. At 175 F or higher, call the fire department to have fire fighters standing by with charged hose lines when the bales are moved, as they may ignite due to the increased availability of oxygen.

#### Electrical malfunctions are a major cause of fires.

All wiring should be enclosed in metal or PVC conduit (pipe). Conduit protects wires from corrosion and destruction by animals. Hire an electrician to install a switch which will turn off all electrical power to the barn without turning off power to the water pump. The switch should be located on the outside of the barn and clearly marked.

Electrical appliances are also a concern for barn owners. Portable heating units and heat lamps are a major cause of barn fires. No heating appliance should ever be left

#### Fire Detection/Alarm Systems

Most residential and commercial smoke detectors will not work in a barn if dust clogs the mechanisms. There are fire -safety companies that specialize in smoke-detection systems for barns. Heat detectors can be used in a closed room like a tack room. They are activated when the air temperature rises 10 degrees in 60 seconds. An intercom system between your house and barn can also be very valuable if someone is home to monitor it. The safest and best fire alarm systems include a device that sends the alarm to a monitoring station through the phone lines to the fire department so that response is immediate, however regular cleaning and maintenance is required to minimize false alarms.

A telephone is a necessity in the barn. In most cases it is best to call 911, however a sign near the phone should clearly state the number of the fire department and the barn address.

#### **Lightning Protection**

Nine out of ten barns struck by lightning burn to the ground from the resulting fire. Lightning may start a fire by striking a metal object, striking and following a power

line to the building or lightening may arc from a tree to the what the fire will likely do. building. Lightning rods are the best protection because they provide the lightening a path to the ground.

You can find a certified lightening rod installer in your area by calling the Lightning Protection Institute at 800-488-6864 or online at www.lightning.org.

#### **Building a Fire Safe Barn**

- Use fire resistant materials (FRTW). Fire retardant treated wood will reduce flame spread. The wood should have a stamp indicating the fire rating of the material
- Use fire retardant paints and varnishes
- Make sure that the barn has large and wide exits! Exits should be as wide as the aisle
- Aisles should be at least 10 feet wide
- Stall door latches should be easy to operate with one
- Hay and bedding should be stored in a separate barn whenever possible
- Upper level hay storage is preferred to ground level because flames and smoke move upwards
- A solid partition (floor to ceiling) should be present in every fourth stall to keep flames from jumping into the next section
- Consider a sprinkler system. They save lives. Dry hydrants can be installed in local ponds

#### Responding to a Fire

#### What to Do When a Fire Starts

Every second is critical once a fire starts! Call the fire department first before you do anything else! Be sure to state to the dispatcher that you are reporting a stable (not barn) fire and horses are involved. Stay on the line until the dispatcher is finished asking questions.

Try to save what you can, but do not endanger your life or others. Remember, once the fire department arrives, the fire department assumes responsibility until the fire is determined to be extinguished. You are required by law to follow all orders issued by the fire department at the scene of a fire. Evacuating animals is not the job of the fire department; however, fire fighters will help you with an orderly evacuation of animals. The fire fighters may not be able to predict what a horse will do, but they understand

#### **Evacuation**

A barn's fire evacuation plan must be individualized for each stable and is dependent on where the fire starts and how it is moving. Having a plan in place and going over it with barn staff and boarders ensures a better response if a fire does break out. When evacuating, start with the most accessible horse. Blind fold only if absolutely necessary. Horses must be led out and away from the barn, otherwise they may attempt to return to a perceived safe place....their stall. Do not just turn the horses loose! It is dangerous for the horses and the emergency personnel. The horses should be kept together and tied or placed in a paddock with a secure gate. Remember they are herd animals and seek companionship when frightened. Some horses will remain fixed and unwilling to leave their stall. Try to comfort the horse and remain calm. Sometimes horses will follow another horse out of the barn. The National Equine Safety Association (NESA) has a more indepth evacuation plan, which can be tailored to your barn.

#### **Fire-Suppression Techniques**

Fire-suppression techniques include portable fire extinguishers, water supplies and sprinkler systems. Never fight a fire if the fire is already large, spreading or could spread and block an escape route. Never use a fire extinguisher if you are not sure it is the right type of extinguisher for that fire. For instance, do not use a Type A Extinguisher on an electrical or grease fire. It is optimal to have a water source close to exits that can be used in the case of fire. Fire suppression is best left to the professional, but in an emergency we all do what we can. Just be safe and don't risk your life or the lives of staff or boarders.

Fire extinguishers should be located near the exit doors, in the tack room, and near the electrical box. Extinguishers should be checked and kept clean monthly and recharged annually. Fire protection companies will do an annual test and recharge of your fire extinguishers to ensure they are ready when you need them and are also able to train you and your staff in the proper use of fire extinguishers. You can find out more about fire extinguishers by going to www.osha.gov/doc/outreachtraining/

Your best resource is you local fire department. Most *local* fire departments are willing to come out to inspect your farm! In doing so they can point out hazards that you may be able to easily remove, they get to know the layout of your property and where your animals are housed. The fire department will be able to make suggestions on fire extinguisher type and placement as well as direct you to resources to develop a fire safety plan for your facility.

## US Dressage Finals Entry and Invitation Qualifications Announced

The 2013 US Dressage Finals presented by Adequan, will be held on November 7-10, 2013 at the Kentucky Horse Park, Lexington, Kentucky. It will be the first head-to-head competition in Dressage showcasing Adult Amateur and Open riders at Training through GP levels, who are US citizens.

The event will include an Open Division at Training through Grand Prix levels and all Freestyles, as well as an Adult Amateur Division with Training through Grand Prix. Horse/rider combinations who qualify through the nine GAIG/USDF Regional Championships, will have the opportunity to compete on the national stage.

Champions and Reserve Champions who have achieved a minimum score, and filed a "Declaration of Intent" will be eligible to compete. "Wild Card" invitations are also available to high-scoring competitors in the Regional Championships who are not otherwise eligible.

## Protective Headgear Rule Change for Dressage to Go into Effect April 1, 2013

Lexington, KY- The United States Equestrian Federation (USEF) wishes to remind all dressage competitors of the rule change to DR120. This change goes into effect on April 1, 2013 and necessitates the usage of protective headgear by anyone mounted on the grounds at all USEF dressage competitions.

DR120 has been amended to require protective headgear as follows: From the time horses are officially admitted to the competition grounds by competition management, anyone mounted on a horse at any time on the competition grounds including non-competing riders, riders on non-competing horses, and those competing in all classes and tests, including Para-Equestrian tests must wear protective headgear as defined by this rule and otherwise in compliance with GR801. Any rider violating this rule at any time must immediately be prohibited from further riding until such headgear is properly in place. Protective headgear is defined as a riding helmet which meets or exceeds ASTM (American Society for Testing and Materials)/SEI (Safety Equipment Institute) standards for equestrian use and carries the SEI tag. The harness must be secured and properly fitted.


