Over the weekend of July 8 and 9, Jan came to Topline Stables in Aurora to teach a clinic. In a lecture on Saturday, Jan went over his recipe for developing a horse through Grand Prix. Every day, he gets the horse forward, relaxed, in rhythm, and on the bit. Those are his prerequisites to practicing fancy movements every trained to respond more to your seat, but then it becomes more single ride. Jan pointed out that there are multiple movements that use the exact same aids. The horse knows the difference because of the timing of the application of the aids. You can give the correct aid at the wrong moment and that is still a mistake. He believes that the and even different on the same horse in different moments.

The overriding theme of his teaching was connection. His definition of pulling: any restricting aid that is stronger than the driving aids at that moment. He helps her get her horse's hindquarters engaged, and works on adjustability of 1000 trots, and 1000 canters. Jan on the other hand while also working on lightness and self-carriage, helps Janeen prepare to ride a test. He really helps her get set up for the next movement in a test situation.


